OIL WELL FLOWS 60 YEARS

The "Old Faithful" among oil wells is located near Newhall, Calif. After nearly fifty years, it is still producing its fair and a half barrels of oil each day. It was the first well sunk in California and led to the discovery of the oil fields on the Pacific coast. All of the other wells which were drilled around the first have long since dried up. It stands like an old patriarch, telling us after having yielded a total of more than a million barrels, says Popular Science Monthly.

A Mexican deer hunter is said to have stumbled upon the site in following a trail through Pico Canyon, now in Los Angeles county. He happened upon an otter of black, sticky fluid, some of which he took to a mission settlement at San Francisco where it was recognized as petroleum. A few years later, in 1879, a former resident of an oil-producing district in Pennsylvania bought a crude drilling outfit to the spot and sank the famous well which has been working constantly ever since.

POISONED CLAMS KILL FOUR; BEDS UNDER QUARANTINE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—With all clam beds on the shores of Marin and Sonoma counties under a strict quarantine ordered by Walter M. Diekle, director of the state department of public health, indications were today that five San Francisco residents stricken after eating toxic clams, would recover. Four other persons have died within the last week after eating clams or mussels gathered off the northern California coast.

While an outbreak of mussel poisoning occurred in July, 1927, this year was the first in which cases of clam poisoning have been observed. In the state board of health, said Dr. Diekle today, in making public results of research work on causes of the poison.

Efforts to determine the exact cause of the poison, which in 1927 afflicted 192 persons and killed six, have not yet culminated in a definite diagnosis. Dr. Diekle said, but the research work done by the department during the last two years indicated the poison is a result of an organic change influenced by fluid and spawning conditions of the mussel.

A very recent and incomplete research, Dr. Diekle said, tended to show the same condition in the clam-caused poisoning which might affect humans.

The department has definitely determined that the poison is not the result of bacteria, copper salts, parasites, stagnant pools or exposure to sun, and it has been found that clams taken from different depths show the virulence.

GRANTS PASS IS FIGHTING RAISE IN WATER RATES

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 8.—The public service commission hearing of the emergency petition of Grants Pass for a better municipal water supply and more adequate fire protection opened here today. Frank J. Miller presided as chairman of the commission.

A few days ago it became known that the Rogue River Water company, owning the franchise, has reorganized under the corporate laws of Delaware as the Grants Pass Water company.

Complications in the case were predicted when it became known yesterday that the new company had filed a petition with the commission seeking an immediate increase in water rates averaging approximately twenty per cent.

DANCING DOLLY AND NECKLACES WORTH \$280,000 LOCATED

PARIS, Aug. 8.—Roszka Dolly, of the dancing, polka sisters, who is accused by two Paris jewellers of having failed to pay for two pearl necklaces, was found by police today at Avron, at the home of Roszka's sister and dancing partner. The necklaces, valued at 2,000,000 francs (approximately \$280,000), also were located at the sister's home.

Roszka and the pearls were brought to Paris and taken before the judge. The jewellers were ordered to identify the dancing girl.
