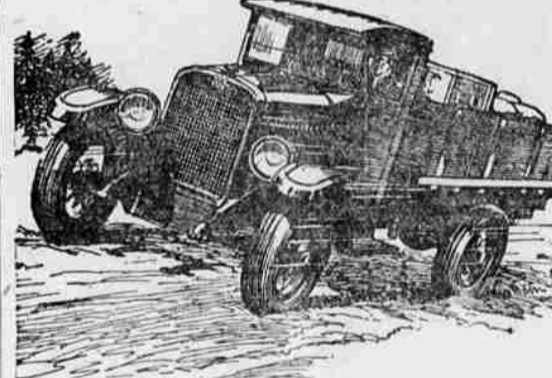

Stowaway Saves He's Happy
PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 8.—Albert Buschow, Graf Zeppelin stowaway, was taken to New York today for deportation to Germany.

The tall, blond German baker's boy was given a hearty farewell by other deportees at the immigration station in Gloucester, N. J., and then was brought to the Rock Island terminal in this city and placed aboard a New York train.

"I am really happy at the thought of seeing bark home," he said. "Everyone has been very lenient when I am given trial for becoming a stowaway. When it is all over I intend to return to my job in the bakery."

He wore a new blue suit, an entire outfit of clothing having been presented to him. In addition he had \$8, five dollars of it having been the gift of an immigration official. He became 18 years of age yesterday.

Winds Favorable

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The weather bureau announced today that the Graf Zeppelin would have fresh west winds and partly overcast skies until she reached the Grand Banks region and that wind conditions should be ideal for the remainder of the trip to the British Isles.

A well developed area of high pressure, indicating calm or fair weather, the bureau said, was central or a short distance north of the Azores and that it extended from southern Ireland to Bermuda. A disturbance was reported northwest of Ireland, another over Hudson bay and a third off the southwest coast of Greenland, but the Graf Zeppelin was expected to pass to the south of all three.
