

EVACUATION OF RHINELAND MOOT CONFERENCE POINT

THE HAGUE, Aug. 8.—French and German views of evacuation of the Rhineland were stated flatly today to each other by Premier Briand and Gustav Stresemann, German foreign minister, in a private conversation.

While the French premier and German foreign minister were in accord on the general principle of evacuation of the occupied district, they were at complete variance on the measure of control which is to be substituted for military forces.

M. Briand raised no objections to Dr. Stresemann's contention that evacuation should be concluded within three months, after adoption of the Young plan, except such objections as physical difficulties of removing the men might present.

He told Dr. Stresemann, however, he could not acquiesce so readily in his refusal to consider the setting up of a commission on the left bank of the Rhine to oversee armament activities.

WASHINGTON AND OREGON DRUG CHAIN, JAMIESON'S PLAN

SEATTLE, Aug. 7.—Planning the establishment of a drug store in every city of 4000 or more population in Washington and Oregon, an expansion program to cost several million dollars was announced today by F. T. Jamieson, head of the Jamieson Drugstore, Inc.

Approximately 200 stores will be added to the company's present chain of 25, Jamieson said.

Jamieson's plans call for the acquisition of existing stores in communities in which he intends to expand, or the founding of new stores where necessary.

The concerns will be handled under a stock sharing system, with the individual store operator allowed to hold up to 49 per cent of the stock in that store. In addition, managers and minority owners will be allowed to acquire an unlimited amount of preferred stock in the holding company, Jamieson announced.

Jamieson has been in the drug business for 20 years, although he did not start a chain concern until 1921.

FISH TINY AS ANT AND PORCUPINE WITH RATTLES

The Philippine goby, besides being the world's smallest fish, is the tiniest backbone creature known in science. It measures only three sixteenths of an inch—the size of an ant! Only seventy-five specimens of the goby have thus far been caught and observed by scientists, says Popular Science Monthly.

The championship is held only by the male of the species, the female being a little over a quarter of an inch in length. They are found in the tidal creeks a few miles north of Manila.
