MANCHURIA SWEEP BY FATAL FLOODS

(Associated Press Local Wire) TOKYO, Aug. 8.—Rengo news dispatches from Mukden, Manchuria, today said that floods, following heavy rainfall, have caused many deaths and widespread destruction in southern Manchuria. Eighty dead and injured were reported from one village near Liaoning. Broken bridges and washed-out tracks caused suspension of traffic along much of the south Manchurian railroad. Damage was greatest between Mukden and Antung.

SOVIET-CHINESE TRUCE COLLAPSES; WAR AGAIN LOOMS

(Associated Press Local Wire) TOKYO, Aug. 8.—Japanese dispatches from Manchuria, Manchuria, where representatives of Russia and China have been discussing the situation arising from Chinese seizure of the Chinese Eastern railway, reported this afternoon that the negotiations had broken down. The Chinese delegate announced that they were leaving Manchuria for Nanjing tomorrow. Another Japanese dispatch from Harbin said revival of the tension between Russia and China had marked the resumption of Russian aerial demonstrations over the border. A message from the border this morning said 28 Russian airplanes had maneuvered over the town today and that a force of Russian armored cars had maneuvered close to the border.

ATHLETICS, YANKS SPLIT TWO GAMES AS 40,000 ATTEND

Five Home Runs Banged by Ruth et al in Winning Opener — Pirates Trim Giants.

CHIPMAN (Associated Press Sports Writer) With all but two of the national league teams in transit from west to east yesterday, the spotlight's glare rested upon the double clash of the Yankees and the Athletics in Philadelphia. More than 40,000 Quaker City fans crowded into the park and countless other thousands languished disappointed in the streets outside as the leaders gained an even break with the runners-up in the first two-thirds of what some deem a crucial series.

Led by Babe Ruth, who hit his two-dash with three on base, the Yankees exploded five home runs about the ears of Athletics pitchers in the opening game to win by 13 to 1, only to see the Mackmen run off with the second by 4 to 2, leaving Connie Mack's margin of eleven and one-half games unimpaired.

The Babe hit his four-run homer with one out in the second. It was Babe's second homer with the bases filled in successive games and the twelfth such blow of his career.

Mackmen Win in 8th Roy Sherid deserved a better fate in the nightcap, his second complete game of his major league career of one season. He entered the home half of the eighth with a 2 to 1 lead over George Karsnaw, but three hits, two of them doubles, and a fumble by Lazzeri gave the Mackmen three runs and the game. Connie Mack sent Bob Grove in to pitch the ninth just to remove any doubt that the game was over.

The Athletics and the Yanks will close out their current series with a single game today and then repeat to the west for their final trip of the season. At the meeting between the Indians and the Tigers in Cleveland, Dale Alexander treated himself to four hits which helped the Bengals to halt Cleveland's rush toward third place with a 14 to 4 victory. As a result, the tribe fell from a tie with the Browns for the third rung.

Washington defeated the Red Sox at Boston by 4 to 2, and the Browns and the White Sox were traveling.

The only activity in the national league was at Forbes field, where the Pirates nosed out the Giants by 3 to 1 in the ninth and shaved a more or less inconsequential half come from the margin of the Cubs. The Bruins now top the national field by seven full contests.

OREGON EXHIBIT AT CALIFORNIA FAIR WILL BE LARGE

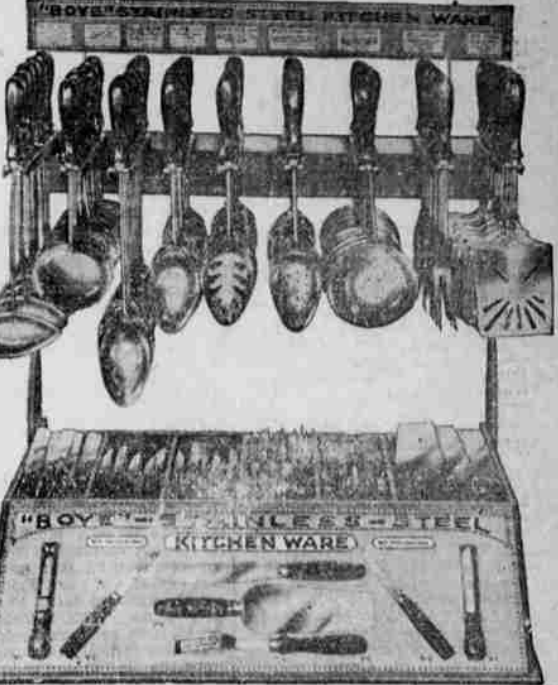
SACRAMENTO, Calif., Aug. 8.—Construction of the Oregon state exhibit for the California Diamond Jubilee State Fair and Western Exposition opening August 21, was started today in the Western building at the state fair grounds in Sacramento.

Oregon's display will occupy 2,000 square feet of floor space and will be located next to the feature exhibit from President Herbert Hoover's Kern county, California farm.

SALEM AND ALBANY OPPOSE SANTIAM POWER PROJECT (Associated Press Local Wire) SALEM, Ore., Aug. 8.—Details concerning the hearing to be held August 31 before the state reclamation commission and a representative of the federal power commission on the application of the Northwest Power company for power rights on the North Santiam river and Marion lake have been received from the United States department of agriculture. The application is being protested by the cities of Salem and Albany on grounds that it jeopardizes possible future development for municipal water supply.

The hearing will be held in the office of State Engineer Rhea Luper. P. H. Dator, district engineer of the United States forest service, will attend the hearing as a representative of the federal power commission with which the application of the Northwest Power company is on file.

The application is for a preliminary permit, which, if granted, will be followed by investigations as a basis for actual development. The application proposes the construction of a dam 55 feet high on the North Santiam at a point 10 1/2 miles east of Detroit, and the construction of a dam at the outlet of Marion lake for the purpose of creating a storage reservoir that will raise the water level of the lake to 70 feet.

The exact identity of the Northwest Power company has never been revealed here.
