

WHEAT RAISERS OF NATION URGED TO DEFER SHIPMENTS

Prospective Crop Shortage Throughout World This Year Bases Advice of Farm Board.

Bad Results of Premature Marketing Pointed Out—Appeals to Fix Prices Denied.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The federal farm board has refused to change in wheat stabilization operations in spite of persistent requests to do so as a means of preventing recurrence of Tuesday's six-cent market price drop. The board's decision to buy up the surplus wheat and store it in available places have flustered the board's critics. It has decided, however, to await perfection of the machinery of the Farmers' National Grain Marketing corporation, which will be charged with handling any emergency and is advising farmers meanwhile to hold back their product, whenever possible.

Told to Hold Back
A formal statement by the board said there was a prospective world shortage of wheat this season and urged the immediate situation "to be hurried and, to some extent, at least, unnecessary marketing of wheat by farmers."

"If the farmers can be induced to hold back their shipments past the congested period," it said, "the effect of stabilization will be accomplished and the farmers generally will benefit by the slower marketing movement."

Plans for the grain corporation projected at the recent Chicago conference are progressing, it went on, and "in the meantime, until the corporation is set up and can function, the board hopes that farmers will observe an orderly marketing program and will not get behind the committee of sixteen" working out the organization program so it may be speedily perfected.

The board also "hopes that all local financial institutions will help the farmer to carry out this program."

Board Is Advised
Most of the appeals made to the board were worded in the most urgent style. One suggested that the board use its \$125,000,000 reserve fund to buy up a number of ships, load the wheat surplus on these ships and anchor them until conditions improve. Others recommended the commandeering of private warehouses to store wheat.

That the board would decline to be moved by such requests no matter how voluminous they become was clearly indicated in its statement.

90,000 PINTS OF CANADIAN ALE IN TWO CARS SEIZED

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, Vt., Aug. 8.—Two freight cars, each filled to the roof with Canadian ale, are in the hands of federal prohibition agents here after what is described as the largest liquor seizure ever made in this state. The total seizure was estimated at 90,000 pints.

The first car was pulled into the Boston and Maine railroad freight yards last night, billed for Chelsea, Mass., from Detroit, Mich., via the Canadian Pacific railway. It was found to contain 45,000 pints of Canadian ale.

The second car, pulled in today, was found to contain 45,000 pints of Canadian ale. The cars were seized by the federal prohibition agents, who announced that it had no intention to engage in stabilization operations now to make any prediction as to what it considered a "fair price."

Nationally known grain cooperative officials and leaders of the three leading farm organizations are now at work perfecting plans for the corporation. An early report on their progress is expected.

PLANS ARE RUSHED FOR BIG UMPQUA RODEO AND RACES

Construction of an arena, corals and additional seats in the grandstand is being rushed today at Oakland, where the Umpqua roundup and racing program are to be held August 16-19.

The race track has been put in condition and is ready to carry the fleet foot racers which will feature the Umpqua show. Horsemen say the track will be fast. Dead grass inside the track has all been burned to make room for the spectacular Indian war drama to be enacted during the wild west show. Within the next few days real Indians will pitch their tents on the banks of the Calapoia where their forefathers once lived.

A special feature of the big parade will be the section including pioneer men and women who are to be guests of the management for Friday, August 16. A prize of \$15 is to be given the oldest man, pioneer and early settler of Douglas county and \$10 to the oldest woman pioneer. Those who wish to enter this parade are requested to send their name and address to the rodeo management at Oakland.

One other feature will be a saddle horse race for Douglas county

horses only. This will be held on Friday and will be a one-half mile free-for-all event.

Rose Smith, famous all-around cowgirl champion of the world, has written Mordie Johnson, stage manager of the rodeo, that she will be at the big show. Cheta Cornick, another cowgirl, will be seen in the bucking horse features. Every effort is being made to make this rodeo and racing program one of the best on the coast. Mr. Fairleigh announces. Talent from every section of the coast will have a part. Radio announcements of the program and movies of the wild west show are scheduled.

Invitations have been sent to the Grants Pass Cave Men, the Lava Bears of Bend, the Pelicans of Klamath Falls and numerous other booster organizations to take part in the opening day's parade.

One recently added attraction to the program will be the famous little cow girl, Miss Francis Anne Florence, aged 19 years. She will ring, as a specialty, "Colorado River."

Mordie Johnson's string of bucking outlaws will arrive in Oakland within the next few days. These horses entirely demolished the chutes and corals on the last day of the Indian congress at Klamath Falls last month. Included in his string are Gold Dust Joe, Mordie, Veterinary, Shooting Star, Ke Kuly, Chisel, Sundown, War Whoop, Hot Shot, Lava Bear and Red Nose.

3-GUN FARMER GIVES UP WITHOUT SHOWING FIGHT

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Harry Welder, a Wheeling, Ill., farmer who escaped into a Cook county forest preserve, after a gun battle with officers yesterday, was apprehended today when he returned to his home.

Welder, although armed with three guns, was arrested without a struggle as he stepped from an automobile.

Graced with liquor, according to officers, Welder attacked a state district commissioner when he was ordered to get out of his car. When the commissioner, John W. Waski, returned with officers, Welder fired upon them with a rifle. The farmer's family fled from the home as Welder held off the attackers. Subsequently he was forced from his barricade with tear gas bombs. Throughout the night a party of officers, with orders to shoot to kill, sought the farmer, supposed to be hidden in the forest preserve.
