LEGION URGED TO LEAD STATE IN AIR PROGRAM

of Marshfield, state commander, said in his introduction. Described as a picturesque sheriff of the west, with two guns and two flaps, Douglas McKay, commander of Capital Post No. 9, stood beside the massive officer and pinned the badge of authority upon his coat lapel. The pin, of gold, bears the words, "Sheriff Grant County," and on the reverse side, "Sheriff Cy Bingham, compliments of Capital Post No. 9, American Legion, 1929."

"I want to thank you all," was the brief remark of the recipient. SALEM, Ore., Aug. 9.—Indication that delegates might battle on the floor of the convention came to light at the eleventh annual session of the American legion Thursday afternoon when two conflicting resolutions were introduced.

Following closely upon the resolution of Portland post No. 1 that an old soldier's home be established near the U. S. Veterans' hospital on Marquam hill, Hood River post No. 22 introduced a resolution along the same line, but suggesting the home be established at Vancouver, Wn. barracks.

Under the proposed program of army reorganization to abandon many of the smaller army posts it will be possible to acquire these valuable properties at a comparatively low figure, the resolution points out. It asks that the petition be sent the war department and the United States veterans' bureau.

Business Activities Recommendations that the work of the Americanization committee be continued were made by C. R. Hotchkiss, chairman, of Portland, and that the radio broadcast weekly, which proved a success during the year, be repeated. Reorganization of the safety first program to include every county, organization of junior traffic officers and the sponsoring of oratorical contests in high schools on topics of Americanization were urged.

Oregon is taking care of all dependent children of ex-service men without assistance from the national department. Judge Jacob Kauzler, of Portland, told the delegates. One hundred children need hospitalization but the Deerebeck hospital, its activities curtailed by lack of or vetoed appropriations, can care for only 45 though it has 75 beds available. Creation of a fund for high school scholarships for children of ex-service men was urged.

The Oregon plan of hospitalization is proving the most successful and workable in the United States and can be perfected by closer cooperation, Dr. J. C. Ghorvally, of Portland, chairman of the hospitalization committee reported.

Membership Growing The Oregon department gained nearly 300 members over the previous year during 1929, Charles Reynolds, of Silverton, chairman of the membership committee, reported. Membership to date stands at 12,157, the largest in the history of the organization.

United States Senator C. L. McNary addressed the convention briefly at the afternoon session. Legislation follows: organizations banded for good welfare, all working together, he said. Unity of purpose is necessary and the American Legion, by adopting this plan, can be the greatest moral force in the nation, he said in closing.

RIDDLE WOMAN'S FATHER WAS AMONG EARLY PIONEERS

Mrs. A. Tomkins of Riddle spent Saturday of last week in Roseburg. I. H. Nichols, Mrs. Tomkins' father, was one of the very earliest pioneers to reach this part of Oregon. Nichols first came through Riddle from the Santa Clara valley in 1847. He chose the Riddle country in preference to the San Francisco bay district and after running a mule pack train for several years from Scottsburg to Yreka, he finally settled in Riddle, in 1851. While in the pack train service, the territory over which Nichols was packing under the protection of the United States government, because the government at that time was encouraging

him the colonization of the western part of the continent. The Nichols pack train was set upon by Indians and robbed and burned. Nichols escaped with his life but the loss of the stock and freight amounted to several thousand dollars which he had to be personally responsible for.

Since the territory was under the protection of the government congress later voted to indemnify all such losses as suffered by Nichols, but for some reason his claim was never paid.

Mrs. Tomkins is one of a family of eleven children of the elder Nichols. Most of the members of this fine old pioneer family are alive and most of them have always made their homes in Douglas county.
