Farm Notes
In many of the new plantings of alfalfa in Oregon which are very weedy and where the weeds have not yet gone to seed, possibilities of future clean stands and of better growing conditions will be improved if the weeds are cut at once, says the experiment station. If the weed growth is heavy it is advisable to rake it off and destroy it, but if it is fairly light it may be left on the field to act as mulch.

REDISCOUNT RATE INCREASE CREATES WILD LIQUIDATION

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—The most sweeping reaction in the history of the New York stock exchange, which wiped out more than a billion dollars in quoted values in 15 minutes of trading, took place today as a result of the panic liquidation of stocks inspired by the unexpected increase from 5 to 6 per cent in the New York federal reserve rediscount rate, the last official blow at securities speculation. Prices of scores of active stocks broke \$5 to \$35 a share on opening transactions of 5,000 to 25,000 shares, but a brisk rally ensued before the end of the first half hour.

Similar recessions in prices took place on the New York curb exchange and in the stock markets of Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago and other leading financial centers. Wall street was taken completely by surprise by the rise in rate as the retention of the 5 per cent discount rate by the Bank of England yesterday was accepted as assurance that no change would be made in the New York rate on the theory that federal reserve officials would not want to embarrass British bankers in their efforts to conserve the dwindling English gold supply.

Florida County Hunts Location for Hanging

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 9.—Denied use of either the roof of Broward county jail or the court yard, federal authorities today were without a place to erect a scaffold and gallows for the hanging of Horace Alderman, convicted slayer of three government officials in a sea fight off the Florida coast in 1927.

Under an order Federal Judge Holstead R. Ritter, Alderman hangs August 17 on the roof of the county jail. County officials, however, have demurred on the grounds that the roof of the jail is bonded by a roofing company and the use of it in this manner would cause the bond to be voided. The government, as second choice, asked if a scaffold and gallows could be erected in the court house yard, and this request was turned down.

Meanwhile, two county commissioners have interposed objections to the hanging on county property when two government reservations, one the coast guard base and another an Indian reservation are nearby.

ADMINISTRATOR OF DRY LAW PUTS OUT EIGHT AGENTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—Dismissal of eight agents from the prohibition service was the first official act of William G. Walker, former Fresno chief of police, who today took the oath of office as prohibition administrator for northern California.

The eight agents, indicted on charges of purloining sugar from raided still supplies, were under suspension by the department, and Walker formally dismissed them from the service on orders from Washington, D. C.

The men are L. A. Werley, J. J. Schreiner, Earl C. Parrish, Thomas Walker, Henry C. Matthias, Andrew Holm, Herman Kruthos and Charles McVick.

Walker said: "The prohibition agent should be educated to distinguish real cases from the insignificant ones which result only in clogging the courts and losing the sympathy of the public."

"Every citizen, wet or dry, is glad to hear of some big run-around, being nabbed."

No immediate changes in the office personnel will take place, Walker said. However, the name of A. B. McReary, Fresno police sergeant, has been mentioned as a possible aide.

Killing "Accident."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Prohibition Commissioner Doran said today an official report on the fatal shooting of Tom Chandler, farmer, by Captain Charles Stevens, federal prohibition enforcement agent, at Poteet, Texas, indicated the shooting was accidental.

The report, said Stevens' statement that Chandler was shot while taking a walk on his farm when the agent slipped and fell, was substantiated by other witnesses.

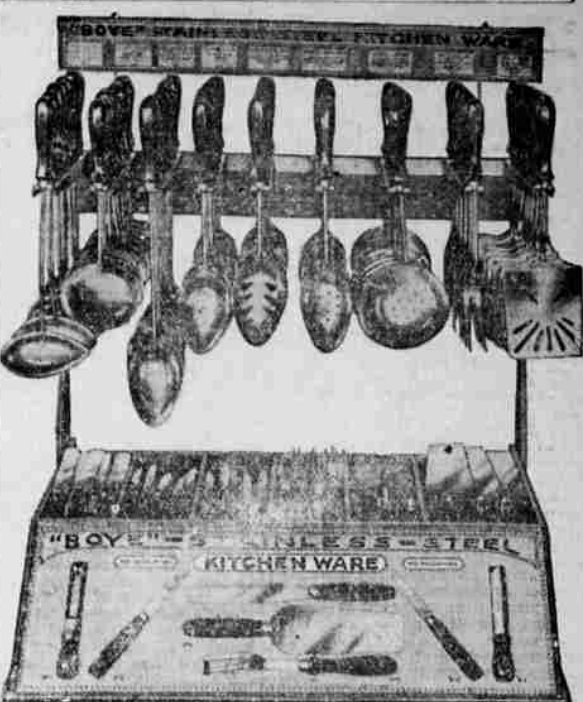
