

DOUGLAS COUNTY FARMERS
GET ADVICE FROM LEEDYCounty Agent Sums Up Agricultural Situation in Weekly
Notes: Root Borer, Brown Rot, Early Molting
and Egg Costs Are Discussed.

The Prune and Peach Root Borer
The root borer is one of the worst insect enemies of prunes and peaches in Douglas county, according to C. L. Long, horticulture specialist. It can be easily and effectively controlled by the proper use of parathion. Many of our weakened, sickly and dying trees are due to the ravages of this insect. It is also responsible for much of our undermatured fruit. The cost of combating this insect is a small item compared to the annual loss due to its unhindered presence.

The method of combating this insect as given in Station Circular 50, of Oregon State agricultural college is as follows:

"Level off the surface of the soil about the base of the tree, but avoid disturbing the soil below the surface. Remove all large masses of sum that may be present at the base of the tree. Having prepared the soil, proceed to sprinkle the finely ground crystals in a ring around the base of the tree. This should form a circle about one inch wide and about two inches distance from the tree trunk. This part of the treatment should be done carefully. If the material is placed too far from the base of the tree the toxic effect of the gas is slightly lessened. On the other hand, if it is placed too near, injury to the tree is likely to result.

"As soon as the parathion gas has been applied, the soil should be covered with a layer of loose earth, and the mound be formed should be well over the material. The first shovel of earth placed above the 'death ring' should be finely divided and carefully placed on top of the crystals in order that the position of the crystals will not be disturbed.

Time of application

"The best time to make the application of parathion is from August 15th to September 15th. It is desirable to delay this treatment to as late a date as weather conditions permit. In months which they may be flying, and to allow the worms to collect about the crown of the tree. A sufficient time, however, must be allowed for the gas to be before unfavorable weather conditions set in. If this treatment is to be effective, the soil temperature must be 55 degrees F. or higher for a period of ten days or more after the material is applied, and the soil must be reasonably dry during this time.

Dose

"From three pounds to one ounce of the parathion is sufficient for an ordinary tree of age and size. The application of the material to younger trees may injure them and is not advised. A measure holding just the required amount is convenient for use in the orchard.

Dusting and Spraying for Brown Rot in Prunes

A light sprinkling of brown rot is prevalent in many of our Douglas county prunes. This year, as determined by a survey recently made by Clayton L. Long, horticulture specialist, and J. C. Leedy, county agent. Weather conditions being right, we are due for a real serious outbreak of brown rot this fall. Loss from this trouble has been as great as 25 per cent of the entire prune crop of Oregon. (Oregonian, Washington.) In individual orchards the loss has been in many cases 50 per cent or more of the crop. This has been accompanied by lowering of the quality of the prunes harvested, dried and packed, which is probably even more serious than the loss in the orchards.

The pre-harvest spray about one month before the prunes ripen will be good insurance against this loss. This spray should consist of Oregon cold mix lime and sulphur or Atomic sulphur, sulphur or a dusting of fine flaking sulphur. Professor H. P. Davis, in Station Circular 52 of the Oregon State Agricultural college, makes the following statement concerning this spray:

"In the five-year test conducted by the Oregon experiment station in different sections of western Oregon and in similar tests by federal investigators, the most effective single spray application of the entire season has almost without exception proved to be that which is given about one month before harvest. It is a protection against attack at the most susceptible period for all stone fruits in any section where brown rot is a real danger. Thoroughness in spraying is essential to success. A fine mist spray with plenty of power back of it will give the best results. This same authority has the following to say about the use of sulphur dust:

"Dust has been tested out, however, for brown rot prevention in the Northwest principally by the federal government. These tests are of interest since they indicate that at least during summer weather, dust containing sulphur as the active constituent are very satisfactory for the control of brown rot on prunes. Sulphur dust is now used extensively in the East for peach brown rot control and to recent tests, by spraying peach orchards on peaches showed excellent results."

Prune Layers Molt Early

At least one during the summer or early fall the poultry flock

should be culled to get rid of the birds that are not paying for their keep. Health and vigor are of first importance in culling poultry. Hens in good laying condition have bright red combs and wattles. Good layers have combs that are waxy in texture. In 3-4-week-old birds, such as the Leghorns, the back and shanks of the heavy layers are ordinarily pale yellow or white. The public bones of a good layer are thin and flexible and when the hen is in laying condition they are wide apart. The skin of a good layer is soft, pliable, and of good texture, and the back is wide and long. Another important point is the time of molting. Poor layers usually molt early, but good ones heavily layers generally do not begin to molt before September or October. Culling not only improves the breeding quality of the flock, but if done early enough will save feeding of surplus hens over a longer period than if the culled birds are all marketed late in the fall.

Egg Costs to Be Analyzed

Of great local interest in connection with the campaign to secure the egg packing plant for Roseburg will be the two addresses delivered during the coming week by Professor H. D. Scudder, chief in farm management, at the Oregon experiment station, summarizing the results of three years' study of the cost of producing commercial eggs.

The O. A. C. extension service has secured Professor Scudder to talk to the businessmen at the chamber of commerce forum lunch at noon on Wednesday, August 14th, and to the poultrymen at the Roseburg city hall at 2:00 p. m. on the same afternoon.

If the Umpqua Valley is to become famed as a poultry center, as is now hoped, it is advisable that both businessmen and poultry producers be familiar with every detail concerning the industry. 4,000 BATTING FIRES AND CALLS FOR MORE SENT

The two fires on Congar creek, in Marion county, were still burning rapidly headway through green timber. They had consumed more than 1,000 acres. The fire that threatened to wipe out the little town of Ronnie, Manitoba, in Canada, was reported still serious yesterday, but it was believed it could be checked if the wind remained favorable. Railroad crews were released to join the fighters.

Oregon Grain Consumed

THILSBORO, Ore., Aug. 10.—A combined prairie and forest fire, which already has destroyed 150,000 acres of shocked grain, a vacant house and barn in eastern Washington county, today was sweeping into a 3,000-acre area of logged-off land toward the homes of numerous settlers.

The fire, of undetermined origin, broke out late yesterday after federal forest officials thought the forest fire situation in Oregon was under control. Fifty men, who had been fighting a large blaze in Klamath county, southern Oregon, were ordered to the Washington county.

Several homes between Shady Brook and Mason Hill, are said to be in the path of the flames. One house of the fire swept into green timber 15 miles east of here and imperiled the home of Otto Scherger.

The area is owned by the Brix Lumber company and in an area of 2,000 acres it is said that nothing has been burned for three years and the entire region is under fire. TACOMA, Aug. 10.—The federal forest service office here has been requested to recruit 50 additional men for immediate fire fighting service in the Rainier national forest near Othello, Washington, in western Lewis county. The men will be rushed to Lewis by truck as soon as they have been obtained. This will increase the number of men combating the Othello fire to 300 men.

The Othello fire is still out of control, William Sothe, central dispatcher for the Rainier forest service, said today. The fire at present is burning over an area of approximately 2,500 acres, having gained between 100 and 1,500 acres in the last two days. The district in which the fire is burning is largely burned over timber, he said, explaining that it thus far has been brought under control every time it reached mature green timber.

Those who see the Umpqua Roundup at Oakland on August 16-19 will get an eyeful. This announces Modoc Johnnie Partridge, manager of the big rodeo, himself a participant in the rodeo.

Modoc Johnnie has shipped his string of famous buckers. They will arrive in Oakland within the next few days.

In the meantime preparations are being rushed under Modoc Johnnie's personal supervision.

Among the latest added attractions is the appearance of the Sutherland community band which will furnish music for the rodeo and for the big street and pavilion dances. The band is composed of 25 pieces and has played engagements in several parts of the state.

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One of the outstanding features of the rodeo is the big Indian pageant and drama. Mr. Partridge predicts that this will draw one of the biggest crowds of any part of the four-day program. The street parade in which hundreds of horses and riders will be seen is also scheduled as a big attraction.

The boxing matches on the night of August 17 are to be the best obtainable, the manager announces. Among other fighters on the card is Mabe Reynolds, former local boy who has made a name in pugilism.

The horse races, one of the big events of the show, will feature a race in which only Douglas county horses participate. Many horsemen of this county have already signified their intention of entering the race.
