RHINELAND EVACUATION DECIDED ON AT PARLEY THE HAGUE, Aug. 13.—Complete evacuation of the Rhineland before Christmas was today practically decided upon at a meeting of the principal delegates of Germany, Great Britain, France and Belgium to The Hague reparations conference. It is expected to begin not later than September 1.

BAD LUCK TRAILS KAISER'S SISTER AND HUMBLE MATE Frau Alexander Zubokoff, formerly Princess Victoria von Schaumburg-Lippe, sister of the ex-king, has fallen upon evil times.

The former princess, disowned by the House of Hohenzollern for her marriage with a penniless Russian emigre, has been forced to leave her beautiful Boon palace and is now living in one room in a furnished house in the town of Mehlern.

One maid remains to attend her, but her entire corps of twenty servants has been dismissed, and her ancestral palace is up for rental.

In spite of her claims that romance compensated for everything, the princess has had nothing but misfortune since she married Zubokoff, formerly a dishwasher in a small Paris cafe.

When the ex-king renounced the princess, she and her husband, some twenty years her junior, attempted to leave Germany and take up residence elsewhere. They obtained passports, but found themselves nowhere.

ROBBER SUSPECT FAILS IN JAIL BREAK ATTEMPT (Associated Press Leased Wire) KESLO, Wash., Aug. 13.—Gunnar Schofstrom of Longview, identified by C. J. Alexander, Longview merchant, as the man who shot him in an attempted holdup Friday, was foiled in an attempted jail break last night when deputy sheriffs discovered him trying to dig his way to liberty from the Cowlitz county jail.

Schofstrom had dug a hole half way through the outer jail wall from the cell where he was confined. He has served terms in the state reformatory at Monroe and in the Walla Walla state prison.

MINISTER SAYS CHURCH NEEDS BETTER MINISTERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SEATTLE, Aug. 12.—What this world needs is fewer, but "bigger and better preachers," the Rev. S. G. Fisher, Tacoma, Wash., told the international convention of the Disciples of Christ here today. The convention has been in session since last Thursday and will continue until Wednesday. "The ear of the public is caught and the mind is filled to surfeit by other agencies so that the cry of Christ to a lost world is scarcely heard," the Rev. Fisher declared. "God forbid that I would bring railing accusation against my brethren. There is no cheaper or meaner criticism than that being hurled today at the churches and the ministers by many from within the circles of the ministry itself. But at the risk of seeming to sin in this respect I wish solemnly to assert that it is my conviction that the disciples of Christ do not now have, nor have they had, a body of ministers which by fitness and training is adequate to the giant tasks that confront us."
