

LAND OFFICE SELLS FOURTEEN TRACTS GRANT LAND TIMBER

NEW COOPERATIVE LAUNCHED ON 50 MILLION CAPITAL

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—A \$50,000,000 cooperative marketing organization was preparing today to place the merchandising of fruits and vegetables on a "big business" basis. The new organization, United

Growers of America, is the second such combination of agricultural cooperatives since the new federal farm board began to function. The first was the Farmers' National Grain corporation.

The National Growers of America will serve 60 subsidiary organizations in 21 states, the announcement said.

Headed by Julius H. Barnes, chairman of the board of the United States Chamber of Commerce, the United Growers will be directed by a group of nationally known men identified with agriculture and cooperative marketing activities.

The board of directors includes: William M. Jarline, former secretary of agriculture; Robert W. Bingham, of Louisville; Arthur R. Rule, executive vice president of the federated fruit and vegetable growers, a national cooperative; Henry W. Jeffers, president of Walker-Gordan company, milk producers, of New York; John Barages, of Minneapolis, banker for northwestern cooperative associations; and Gray Silver, of Martinsburg, W. Va., former lieutenant governor.

The announcement said the United Growers had been organized in compliance with the agricultural marketing act and the Capper-Volstead cooperative marketing act.

LADINO CLOVER RAISERS OF OREGON PLAN POOL

(Associated Press Leased Wire) GILBERT PASS, Ore., Aug. 12.—Growers of Ladino clover, representing 250 acres, will meet here tonight to consider formation of a Ladino pool for shipping and marketing and to cooperate with similar pools in Deschutes and Crook counties where Ladino clover is cultivated in large quantities.

Harvesting here is expected to begin within two weeks, and growers expect to receive \$1.25 a bushel for certified seed. Recent tests made here by state clover representatives showed 78 out of the 250 acres as certified to produce marketable seed.

FARMER'S WIFE KILLED BY FUMES FROM STILL

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WICHITA, Kas., Aug. 12.—Martin Schoenecker, farmer today told Sedgewick county officers that his 20-year-old wife Regina, died yesterday when overcome by fumes from a still at their home.

Schoenecker said that when he entered a cellar at his farm where liquor was in the process of distillation he was overcome by fumes and fell to the floor. His wife rushed after him and attempted to drag him to safety. She too was overcome.

LANE COUNTY TO INCREASE TURKEY CROP THIS YEAR

EUGENE, Aug. 12.—More turkeys are being grown in Lane county this year than last, according to figures compiled by the Lane county membership of the Douglas County Turkey Growers' association. About 300 more birds will be marketed by the association this season than last. It is believed. Last year 3040 birds were marketed with prospects this year for a total of 2,350.

A campaign to increase membership, plans for representation and attendance at the annual election meeting of the Douglas County Turkey Growers' Cooperative association Tuesday, August 13, and plans for marketing turkeys this fall, were discussed by the Lane county group of the Douglas county organization at their meeting in the chamber of commerce rooms yesterday.

Charles Dear of Cottage Grove was named to be nominated as a member of the board of directors of the Douglas county group at the annual election meeting. He was also elected to serve as the official representative of Lane county members of the association at all meetings of the board of directors providing he is not elected to a directorship. H. A. Stoneberg of Coquille was named alternate representative.

It was decided that the members returning to their communities make a concentrated effort to increase the membership of the organization.

Last year practically all the turkeys of the association were sold to the Swift and Company plant which marketed them in the east.

About 16 per cent of the nation's supply of turkeys are grown on the Pacific coast while but six per cent of the nation's population is on the coast, which accounts, for the fact that the birds are largely marketed in the east, said Mr. Dear.

The advantages of cooperative marketing were pointed out. To market intelligently and thus prevent glutting the market was given as the leading advantage.

THIEVES ENTER GLENDALE STORE

(News-Review Douglas County Special) GLENDALE, Aug. 12.—Sneak thieves entered the local MacMarr store sometime between Saturday night's closing time and Sunday morning, when Joe Burroughs, manager, opened up and made the discovery.

A small amount of change amounting to \$5.60 had been left in the till Saturday evening. This was taken. It was not apparent that any stock had been taken and until Burroughs can make a careful check the exact extent of the thievery won't be known.

Entry to the store had evidently been made through a small rear window which was found broken open. The back door which had

been locked from the inside and the key left in the lock had been unlocked and left wide open and with the key gone.

The local police had not noticed anything unusual Saturday or Sunday nights or Sunday and wasn't aware of the burglary until advised Monday.

PANTAGES' GIRL ACCUSER, 3 OTHERS RECEIVE THREATS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—Attorney guards had been posted to stand between Eunice Pringle, 17-year-old co-ed and dancer, and possible violence today, the result of threats growing out of the arrest of Alexander Panagos, multi-millionaire theatre owner who is at liberty under \$25,000 bail pending preliminary hearing on charges of committing a statutory offense and attacking the girl.

Guards were also ordered established over three material witnesses in the case after Dr. Lewis A. Pringle, the girl's father, reported to Byron Pitts, district attorney, that three separate threats were made Saturday night that his daughter "would be taken for a ride" if he did not take her out of town. He said anonymous voices over the telephone told him she had "talked too much."

The three witnesses, who have offices in the Panagos theatre building where the girl charges she was attacked by Pantagos Friday afternoon, have testified to the disarrayed condition of his and the girl's clothing as they appeared at his office door, summoned by her screams.

Miss Pringle said she had gone there in an effort to get her act "pinned on the Panagos vachville circuit." The 24-year-old theatre magnate denied the charges. Preliminary hearing will be held Wednesday.

Red Shoffner entered the Indian box in time to get credit for the victory and gave Cleveland fans something to cheer about by fanning Ruth, Lazzeri and Meusel in the eighth.

Doubles by Judge and Rice in the ninth gave Washington a 3-2 triumph over St. Louis.

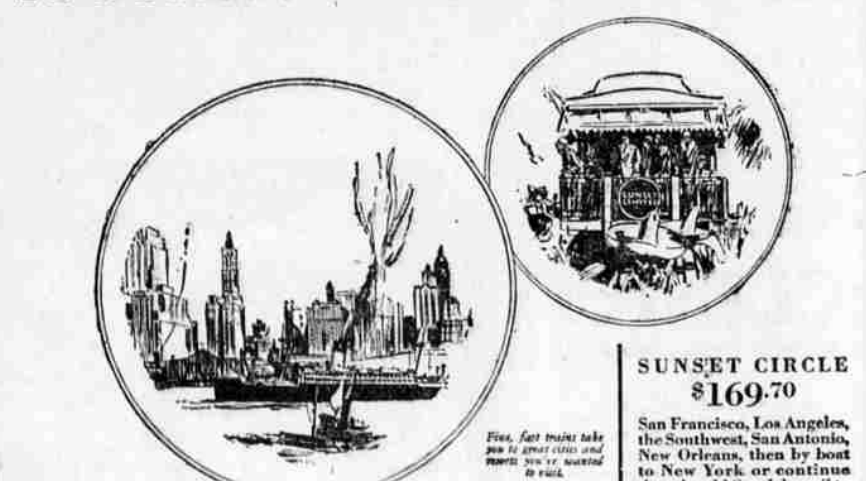

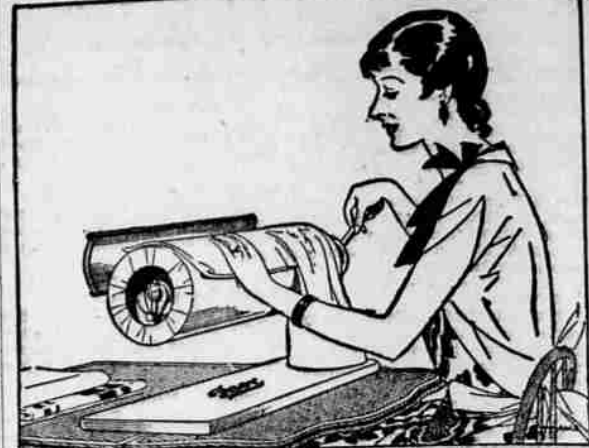
