CANNERY WILL
START BIG RUN
ABOUT AUG. 26

The season's heavy run for the Norton cannery in this city will start Aug. 26, according to present plans. At the present time the cannery is working on vegetables, particularly string beans. Canning of blackberries will keep the plant busy during the ensuing week after which the pear pack will be started. The cannery plans to pack three or four hundred tons of pears this year and has already contracted nearly the full amount. The pear run will be followed by prunes, and it is planned to operate on a larger scale than ever before in canning that fruit. The apple pack will keep the cannery in operation until after the first of the year, it is expected. At the present time only a small force is employed and the plant is working at only a small part of its capacity. Commencing with the pear pack, however, a full crew will be employed and will be kept busy until at least the first of the year. The number of orders received is growing each year, Mr. Norton reports, and the big order placed by the MacMarr and Skaggs Safeway stores this year is making it necessary to more than double the output over any previous year.

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NON-REFUELING
ENDURANCE RECORD
TARGET OF FLIERS

LONG BEACH, Calif., Aug. 14.—Seeking to bring the non-refueling endurance flight record to the United States, Emory Bronte and Jack Reid took off in a cabin model monoplane at 6:04 a. m. today, seeking to better the present mark of 65 hours 25 minutes held by two German fliers.

The craft is powered by a 300-horsepower whirlwind motor and carries 830 gallons of gasoline. The load of 10,000 pounds made the landing dangerous, so the circling dangerous, so the circling headed for San Diego, expecting to return when the fuel supply had been consumed to decrease the load.

A previous attempt a few days ago ended shortly after the take-off when the motor became overheated. Chief Pilot Bronte was a member of the Bronte-Smith combination which first flew from the mainland to Hawaii.
