EXCITING FIGHT CARD IN PROSPECT SATURDAY NIGHT

Boxing Program in Connection With the Oakland Roundup Expected to Furnish Thrills.

The boxing card to be staged at Oakland Saturday, in connection with the Umpqua Roundup, which starts Friday and continues for four days, promises to be an exceptionally fast and exciting one. Charles Towers of Klamath Falls, the promoter, arrived in Roseburg today, accompanied by Mrs. Towers, Mahr Reymers, a former Roseburg boy, and Tiger McDonald, of Lakeview, and announced that all arrangements in connection with the card have been completed.

The headliner will be a 10-round engagement between Bob Judd, of Portland and Joe Blackwell of Eugene. Both of these fighters are well known in this state. Judd recently bested Terry Kileen at Lakeview, indicating that he is a fast fighter and hard hitter. Blackwell has fought in Roseburg on several occasions and is a terrific slugger and able to absorb all kinds of punishment, so that the fight should furnish plenty of excitement.

Reymers and Jack Nash will fight the 6-round semi-final. Reymers, who left Roseburg about four years ago and went to Lakeview, has been fighting rapidly to the front of Oregon boxers. Although he has been fighting only about two years, he is making an excellent reputation for his ability, and he is in the front rank of his class. Jack Nash was seen in action at Roseburg recently in a fight with Pat Padelford of Medford.

Tommy O'Brien of Eugene and Sammy Goldstein of Vancouver will fight the 5-round special event at 140 pounds.

Tiger McDonald of Lakeview and Bunney Dotson of Portland, 117 pounds, will appear in a 6-round added attraction, while there will also be one or more additional preliminaries.

Promoter Towers expects the card to be one of the big attractions of the roundup program.

ATHLETICS, CUBS CONTINUE TO PILE UP TOP MARGINS

The Athletics are shipping steadily along again as eastern American league clubs prepare for the second series of their final western invasion. Following Rube Wabber's brilliantly pitched effort against the Tigers on Monday, old John Piesquerra turned in a near game yesterday to shade Victor Sorrell by 4 to 3 in the Mackmen's last appearance of the season in Detroit.

The victory of the Athletics gave them three out of four in Detroit and enabled them to stretch their lead to twelve and one-half games their greatest margin of the season. The Yanks were noosed out in Cleveland by 3 to 2.

The Red Sox escaped from Chicago with the last game of the series, 8 to 2. The Brewers turned on the Senators, 14 to 2, in the getaway game at St. Louis.

With half of the National league clubs idle because of the advancement of games in the schedule at Brooklyn and Philadelphia, the Cubs nosed out the Braves by 4 to 2 in the last game of the series at Boston, and increased the Chicago lead to eight and one-half games. The Reds thrashed the Giants by 3 to 1 in the last five games at the Polo grounds, and at the same time broke the spell Fred Fitzsimmons had held over them. Bill Fitz had a record of five victories over the men of Hendricks until yesterday, four of them by the shut-out route.

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EXPECT LARGER CROP TURKEYS THIS SEASON

ologist from the state college, gave a most interesting address on turkey diseases, and was kept answering questions for nearly an hour. He also posted two diseased birds, explaining the symptoms of diseases and methods of cure.

A basket dinner was served at noon, after which Paul V. Maria, director of the college extension service, spoke on the new farm bill. He was one of the three delegates from Oregon to the American Institute of Cooperation at Baton Rouge, where he had an opportunity to meet personally the members of the new farm board and to secure their views with regard to the relief measures.

It is impossible, Mr. Maria stated, for the farm board to deal with the individual farmers so that it is therefore necessary for them to deal with farm cooperatives and organizations. The board, Mr. Maria stated, favors a large organization of the farmers, in which the local cooperatives will be federated with central exchanges, so that the board can deal directly with a few major groups, which in turn can pass along the relief measures to the federated units and thereby to the individual farmers.

Turkey Organization Grows
Mr. Maria spoke at considerable length on the turkey market situation. The Pacific coast, he stated, is rapidly organizing for cooperative marketing of turkeys. This so far has been done largely on a county basis. The next step, Mr. Maria stated, is to federate these county units in a central exchange, representative of all. He believes in the necessity for maintaining the county organizations, but contends that all should be represented in one large advisory body that can deal directly with major conditions.

Following the excellent address given by Mr. Maria, Herbert Beyers, manager of the county association, reviewed the work of the past season.

The total volume of business, he stated, amounted to \$150,000, with the association handling 454,000 pounds of turkeys during the season. The association deducted 3 cent per pound to cover its expenses, and these deductions, together with other receipts amounted to \$18,043.49. Expenses amounted to \$17,715.46, leaving a cash balance of \$328.03. The association also has equipment and supplies valued at \$110.50, making a very satisfactory financial situation for the beginning of the present season.

Recommendations Made
Mr. Beyers made several recommendations regarding the methods to be followed during the coming shipping season.

He advised that instead of selling the birds loose at the warehouse that the association grade, pack and load the turkeys and sell them, f. o. b. cars. This, he believes, would be profitable to the association and would result in benefit, particularly to the small purchaser.

A company buying turkeys and loading at several points must have graders at each loading station, which results in considerable expense. A certain deduction is also made for packing, which is usually slightly in excess of the actual cost.

If the association does its own grading it eliminates the expense of sending in graders, and by packing the turkeys the association saves the difference between the actual cost and the amount usually used by the buyers. It is believed that these savings would result in better prices. It would also make it possible for the buyer who wanted one or more cars as a comparative small order to pay an attractive price, as he would not have to go to the expense of sending in a representative and could thereby pay that cost in the form of an additional price in order to secure fancy birds to fill his needs.

Three Grades Proposed
Mr. Beyers also proposed that the association establish three grades. Heretofore birds have been sold as No. 1 and No. 2 grades. He proposes that there be a No. 1 fancy grade, a No. 1 and a No. 2 grade.

The intermediate grade would take care of the birds that are really better than No. 2, but are not quite good enough to be classed as fancy. The buyers, he states, have been grading the birds on a basis for several years, but have been selling them on a two-grade basis.

This means that the best of the No. 2 class has been purchased from the grower at a low price and then sold for a much better price as an intermediate grade. The buyers, the manager stated, naturally desire to continue the two-grade basis, as they make considerable profit on the re-grading, but the association by establishing grades conforming to the packer's methods, can realize the profits for the members.
