COOPERATION OF FARMERS AVERTS SERIOUS FIRE

A forest fire of unknown origin was discovered on the Walter Ler ranch near Tiller Sunday morning. The ranch is within the protection boundary of the South Umpqua ranger district of the Umpqua national forest.

A thick blanket of smoke had drifted in from larger fires on adjoining forests resulting in poor visibility. To Mrs. James Dumont, a neighbor from an adjoining ranch, goes the credit for first sighting and reporting the fire. Within a short time a crew of eight neighbors from nearby farms were at the scene. The two forest service firemen came all the way from the Tiller ranger station. The prompt action of the neighbors and the close cooperation between them and the forest service firemen resulted in the fire being suppressed. According to Hugh A. Ritter, district ranger, the close cooperation of the ranchers and the forest service men made short work out of what might have been a very serious fire.

The fire started in a stubble field and spread to an oak grub thicket and a rail fence. The fire covered an area of a quarter acre. This fire occurred on private land paying a patrol tax to the Douglas County Fire Patrol association, but protected by the United States Forest service.

CALENDAR TRIPS THIEF'S DEFENSE

CALIFORNIA MAN PAYS FINE FOR LEAVING FIRE

Herbert Staples, of Ocean Park, California, was fined \$5, and costs in the justice court today, following his arrest on a charge of leaving a camp fire burning unattended in the Umpqua national forest. Due to the extreme fire hazard at

the present time the forest service officials are very carefully patrolling the camps and are taking every precaution to prevent fires from gaining a start. Carelessness, particularly in the matter of leaving burning camp fires, will result in penalties whenever the guilty parties can be apprehended, the officials state.

EDITOR FREED OF LIBEL CHARGE IN SPEEDING CASE

SAN JOSE, Cal., Aug. 14.—H. L. Baggerly, Los Gatos, Cal., editor, stood cleared today of a criminal libel charge, brought by Police Judge Percy O'Connor of San Jose because Baggerly had editorially criticized him for his conduct of the case of Miss Josephine Grant, San Francisco society girl, accused of reckless driving, possession of liquor and operating her car while intoxicated.

Baggerly, who charged that Judge O'Connor had bowed to wealth and social prestige in giving Miss Grant a suspended \$50 fine on the first charge, was freed during his preliminary hearing late yesterday on motion of the prosecuting attorney, Frank Waterhouse, who acted at the instance of the complaining witness.

Waterhouse asked Justice of the Peace Chester Moore to dismiss the libel charge after Baggerly had testified no malice was intended in the publication of articles criticizing Judge O'Connor. The editor also contended that he had not attacked the honesty or integrity of the judge, and had not accused him of misfeasance, nonfeasance or malfeasance.

State Senator Herbert C. Jones, attorney for Baggerly, addressing the court after the dismissal, characterized the action as a vindication of the freedom of the press. "We must not forget a bigger issue has been involved," said Jones, "the issue of the freedom of the press. This principle, first expressed by John Milton, has been vindicated."

Senator Jones paid tribute to Baggerly as a newspaper man, saying that despite "social, political and financial pressure" he had always dared to express himself as he thought right.

ECKERSON ENTERS DERBY

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 14.—Major Gilbert Eckerson of Springfield, Ore., has entered the Portland-Cleveland derby of the national air races. The race will start from the Port of Portland airport, Aug. 23. The report of Major Eckerson's entry was received today from Cleveland.

PROPOSERS OF 13 MONTHS' CALENDAR COMPLETE REPORT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—A report favoring revision of the calendar by the formation of 13 months of equal length was presented to Secretary Stimson today by the national committee on calendar simplification for transmission to the league of nations.

The committee was organized in 1928 under the chairmanship of George Eastman, Rochester, N. Y., at the suggestion of the league of nations.

The religious aspects of a calendar change, the experience of business concerns with private calendars, and an analysis of the "grave defects" of the present system all were set out in the lengthy report which declared that any inconvenience in making the change would be outweighed by the permanent advantages of a more simple calendar.

Under the plan of 13 months of 28 days each, the new month would be placed between June and July.

"The 365th day of the year would be dated December 29," the report explained, "with the suggested name of 'peace day' or 'year day' and observed as an extra Sabbath. Leap year would be placed on June 29 and observed as an extra Sabbath or holiday."

ALLEGED WOMEN ATTACKERS ALSO MURDER SUSPECTS

HUTCHINSON, Kans., Aug. 14.—Two youths, under arrest here in connection with a robbery and attack on two Concordia, Kans., women tourists, today were also ordered held for federal investigation concerning the slaying at Phoenix, Ariz., of Paul E. Reynolds, department of justice agent.

The two youths, who said they were walking from Los Angeles, gave the names of R. L. Brownell, 18, of Athens, Ga., and Russell Pegues, 29, of Clarksville, Ariz., and denied any connection with the attack on the women.

The boys, answering the description of two "hitch hikers" who robbed and slashed Mrs. Beatrice Walsh, 34, and Miss Leda Beauregard, 21, of Concordia, Kas., and left them in a pasture near Hoxie after driving away in their motor car, were arrested while walking along a road near here yesterday. Bloodstains on a pack they carried and other stains on a hunting

knife in their possession excited suspicions of officers. The two women, who were traveling from Colorado to Concordia, and had picked up their assailants near Limon, Colo., are recovering from razor cuts at a Quinter, Kas., hospital.
