"SYNCOPATION" IS FEAST OF MUSIC SPARKLING DIALOG

All-Talker at the Antlers Theatre Dazzling Entertainment.
RKO has turned the trick with a hundred per cent all-talker.
In "Syncopation," first of the Antlers theatre series, which opens today for a 3-day run at the Antlers theatre, this promising outfit has given to an eager world of fans one of the happiest shows of the current season. It is a piece full of charm and melody and color and heart interest, rollicking and rocking with the hit and lift of jazz, vocal with the mellow songs of superb golden artists, peppy with chorine coverings, and a brilliant and romantic musical extravaganza in film form that should make and break records at the Antlers theatre.
"Syncopation" is derived gorgeously from "Stepping High," the novel by Gene Markey, and which truthfully about the careers of the team of Durrell and Sloans, a pair of Broadway hoeders, wedded, and striving for Broadway honors. Morton Downey's singing of three new song hits, especially written for this show figured among the outstanding features of a show electric with delightful numbers. There was a song by the piquant and vicious Dorothy Lee which exercised its delightful spell and another by Gonia Zielenska, distinguished soprano soloist. Two numbers by a string orchestra and dancing on the light fantastic by Barbara Bennett, daughter of the famed Richard Bennett, and former partner of Maurice, one of the greatest dancers of all time, provided other notable moments.
The song hit of the piece is perhaps the theme song, "Till Always Be in Love With You," a melodious and marvellous lyric, as though there was a constant succession of intriguing vocal selections including "Joricho," "Do Something," etc.
Altogether a swell entertainment in this trying hot weather, the musical film extravaganza with its song and melody magic, its heart-line Haber, its rich sets, gorgeous gowns and costumes, its heart-grIPPING story and its dazzling stars. Don't miss "Syncopation."
