PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 15.—After being stationary for some time, butter prices were advanced on trading at the Portland produce exchange today. Shortage of supplies boosted the product. Extras were up 1¢ to 45¢, standards one cent higher at 44¢ and prime firsts half a cent more at 43¢. Firsts were unchanged.
Butterfat was also up. The station price was 45¢, truck price 46¢ and delivered price 48¢.
Eggs were firm, but prices were undisturbed.
Cantaloupes from The Dalles have replaced those which have been coming to the east side market from the Yakima section. The price eased down to 17¢ Thursday.
Corn was also cheaper at \$1.10 to \$1.15 for a sack of six dozen ears.
Potatoes went down to \$1.75 for a sack of 70 pounds.
Green peppers dropped from 75¢ to 50¢ a box.
Cucumbers were 75¢ a box.
Trading was slow.

IMMIGRATION LAW KEEPS DAUGHTER, DEPORTS MOTHER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—Federal immigration laws came between a mother and her 3-year-old daughter here today as orders were issued to deport Mrs. Anna Nichols, 25, to Greece. Mrs. Nichols has lived in this country for 23 years but because she returned to this country illegally through Mexico after having made a trip to Greece, she must leave again. Mrs. Nichols was born in Greece. Returning there eight years ago she married a Greek army officer. They came to America together by way of Mexico, shortly after the birth of a son, Teddy, who is 6 years old. Mrs. Nichols recently obtained a divorce.
Immigration authorities ruled that Mrs. Nichols and her son, Teddy, were inadmissible to remain but that her little daughter having been born in America, must remain here. The little girl was sent to a relief home.
Congresswoman Florence P. Kahn telegraphed Secretary of Labor Davis yesterday, asking if a stay could not be granted and received this reply:
"Nothing can be done."
Mrs. Nichols declared her mother was seriously ill in Everett, Wash.

The Seals, displaced at the top by the Hollywood Stars the day before, downed the southern crew in the twelfth inning by a score of 5 to 4. In the final inning, Simons Jolley won for the San Francisco Seals by cracking out his second homer of the game.
Oakland did its utmost to best the Senators at Sacramento, but the home boys noosed out the bay team, 9 to 3.
Los Angeles pulled the Montreal club down to equal footing in the standings by making a two straight over the Reds with a 4 to 5 victory.
In the Portland-Seattle contest on the Indians' lot, Walters had a slight advantage in a pitchers' battle with Cox. The Ducks defeated the tribesmen 2 to 1. The Seattle club used four pitchers, hit-
