

2 NEW WITNESSES INTRODUCED INTO PANTAGES AFFAIR

Presence of Other Parties After Alleged Attack on Girl Narrated by Tenant.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 15.—Testimony that Equine Pringle, 17-year-old dancer, was struggling to escape from the private office of Alexander Pantages as W. L. Gordon, prosecution witness, arrived at the scene of the alleged attack when he last Friday, was on record today in the theatrical magnate's preliminary hearing on statutory charges.

Gordon, who testified that the girl's repeated screams drew him from his office in the Pantages building, declared on the witness stand that as he reached Pantages' office door Miss Pringle's hand was reaching through it. As he pushed the door open, Gordon testified, the girl fell into the room, and then ran down the hall screaming for aid.

Two Others Present

The witness declared as he looked in the door he saw Pantages. Then a young woman came behind him attempting to "reach around me and close the door." Then, Gordon states, a young man in a blue suit rushed past me into the room, helped Pantages to his feet, and slammed the door.

INDIAN'S WEDDING TO WHITE WOMAN OBJECT OF ATTACK

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 15.—An amended complaint to annul the marriage of Jackson Barnett, wealthy Indian, and obtain a refund of all property and money held by his white wife, Mrs. Anna Barnett, was filed by the government today.

The complaint followed the government's victory in the Barnett case before the federal courts of New York, which ordered the return of \$559,000 in Liberty bonds given by the Indian to the Baptist Home Missions society. The government planned to place the securities in trust for Barnett.

Three co-defendants were named in the amended complaint. They were Leslie Hewitt, California guardian of Barnett's property; Maxine Sturgess, Mrs. Barnett's daughter, and the Bank of Italy National Trust and Savings association.

In 1929 the government charged, Mrs. Barnett learned of the Indian's wealth. She was alleged to have carried him off in a taxicab and attempted to marry him, but officials of the county where Barnett lived knew him and refused to issue a license.

A month later, the government alleged, she induced him to go to Coffeyville, Kans., where they were married. A second marriage, the government claims, was performed in Newton county, Missouri. Since then Barnett, it has been filled with numerous investigations on the belief his wife was conspiring to obtain his fortune.

ORGANIZATION NEW GRANGE COMPLETED

FARM JOURNAL EDITOR SCORES TARIFF BILL

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 15.—H. A. Wallace, editor of Wallace's Farmer of Des Moines, Iowa, speaking on the proposed Smoot-Hawley tariff at the institute of politics today, characterized it as "the worst of the many iniquitous tariff bills injuring the American farmer."

"The proposed increase in tariff on Canadian feeder cattle would benefit the range cattlemen," he said, "but I question whether the corn belt farmers who buy range cattle benefit by the high feeder cattle prices exacted by the range

men behind the tariff wall. "The United States and Canada should both bring a gradual lowering of their tariffs, especially on manufactured goods. The United States tariff policy is continually provoking Canadian hostility, which results in a lessening of the common economic welfare of the two countries."

1100,000 FIRE DESTROYS KLAMATH FALLS PLANT

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 15.—Fire of undetermined origin wiped out the Spring street iron works here today with loss estimated at \$100,000.

The fire was one of the most serious in the history of the city. A trenching machine valued at \$30,000, was destroyed. It was owned by contractors in charge of the \$300,000 sewer project. A large truck valued at \$7000 was demolished.

F. M. Loosely, manager, carried but \$5,000 insurance on his property, he said.

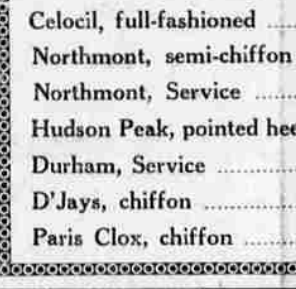
