Thursday they climbed the Middle Sister and were planning to go to Benson lake today. Saturday will be spent on Collier Glacier and Sunday will be another rest day. They will return home Monday.

MAYORS WILL DIRECT ANNUAL TWIN ROUNDUP

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 16.—Competitive stunts and skits, staged under the direction of the mayors of important Oregon cities and towns, will be one of the highlights of the annual Twin Roundup, which will be held on Labor Day, Monday, September 2.

Invitations have been mailed to the chief executives of many Oregon municipalities the past week and already acceptances are beginning to come in. Originally combined with humor will be the motifs of the various offerings.

This will be only one of a number of attractions that will be on the program, which will include boat races, stunts, games, contests, a program that will entertain the visitors at all hours of the day.

Last year's Roundup brought 160 pairs of twins from all parts of Oregon to Albany. Registrations thus far received indicate that the entries will be far more numerous and more entries are being received daily.

The committee this year is offering more prizes to the twins and is also increasing the number of classifications as follows:

Twins that look most alike. Twins that look most unlike. Oldest twins. Youngest twins. Twins that come from farthest point.

Twins born on February 29 that look most alike.

Grand prize drawing for twins holding lucky number. Special prize to family exhibiting more than one pair of twins. Special prize to triplets.

In the first five classifications first, second and third prizes are being given. Competition open to all residents of the United States and Canada. Besides the mayors of the cities, Governor Patterson, state officials and men prominent

in the civic, industrial and business life of Oregon will be present. All twins who wish to enter the Roundup should register with T. W. Musgrave, Albany, Oregon, chairman of the registration committee, on or before Saturday, August 31, when registrations close.

DOUGLAS COUNTY PRODUCTS WILL BE ON EXHIBITION

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 16.—Douglas county's products, along with those of the whole state of Oregon, will be exhibited to the people of California at that state's Diamond Jubilee, during the ten days from August 31 to September 10 at Sacramento. It is announced here by Governor L. L. Patterson.

The cooperation of the Roseburg Chamber of commerce, the county court, and other local agents, is asked by the state in getting up the exhibit, which is sponsored by the Oregon state fair board, with P. M. Love, of Ashland, in charge of arrangements. The exhibit will make a particular appeal to tourists, who will be able to gain an idea of Oregon's great beauty of flowers and trees, her wealth of wild game and fish, and industrial and agricultural products. It will be as representative of the whole state as it is possible to make it.

A live Oregon buck, a whole colony of live beaver, a large quantity of live wild ducks, with pheasants and quail, two pet bear,

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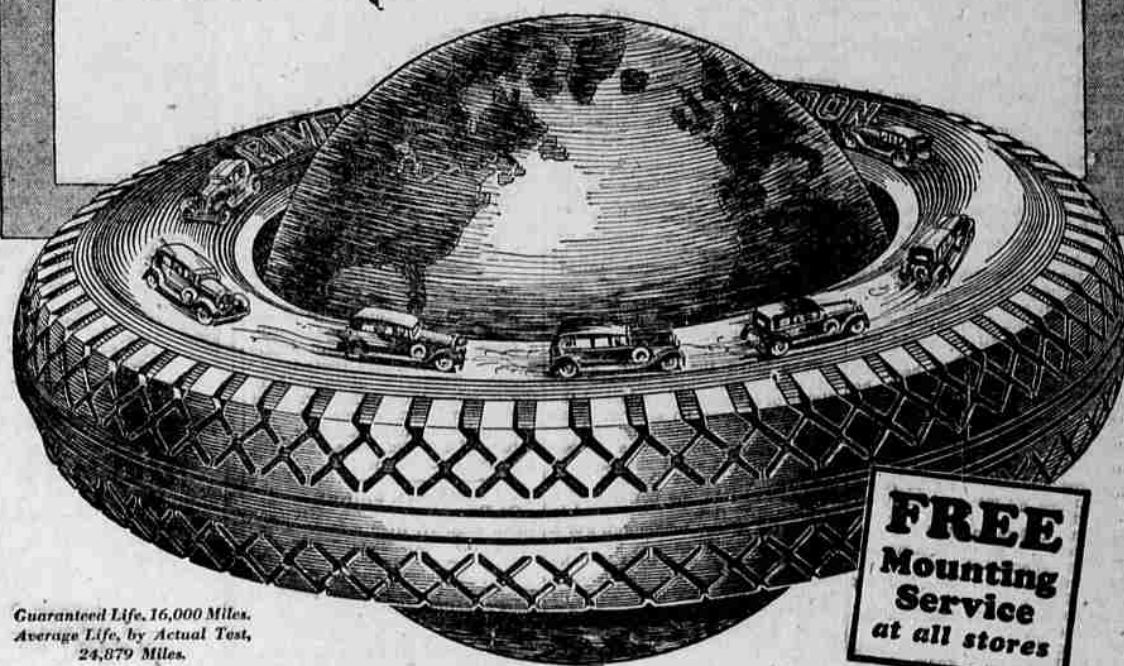
