## STATE PRESIDENT SPORTSMEN'S CLUB IS WELL PLEASED

Charles Lockwood, president of the Oregon State Sportsmen's Association is greatly encouraged over the manner in which the various clubs of the state are taking hold of his program for the creation of a strong and active organization. Practically every club in the state has endorsed his plans, he states, and many of them have already sent in their dues under the new schedule.

A check for \$1152 was received yesterday from the Multnomah Anglers and Hunters club, representing more than 2,000 members. Mr. Lockwood upon taking over the position of president immediately outlined plans for greatly enlarged activities. Heretofore the various clubs of the state have been rather loosely bound together and Mr. Lockwood believed that there should be a firmly knit central organization, maintaining a live magazine to keep members informed of everything transpiring in the sportsman's field.

He advocated an increase in dues for each club so that the state organization would receive \$1 for each member, and almost without opposition this plan has been adopted.

With this money it is planned to work for game propagation and protection and to work out a plan whereby legislative work pertaining to game laws can be handled in a more efficient manner. Instead of each club of the state introducing bills, many of which conflict with those

from other parts of the state, all will be submitted to the state committee which will work out definite recommendations to submit to the legislature with the backing of all the clubs as a whole, which it is believed will be much more effective than the present system.

**ARMED GUARD THREAT IN LAKE COUNTY RANGE WAR**  
LAKEVIEW, Ore., Aug. 15.—Reports that several homesteaders in the Wagonaire mountain district have threatened to employ armed guards to protect their fences were heard here today as the battle of words still raged over the action of a humane society officer in cutting a homesteader's fence that horses and cattle on the open range might secure water at the homesteader's water-hole. Cutting of the fence by Harley Brown, humane society deputy, precipitated what threatened for a time to become a revival of old range wars between open-range cattlemen and homesteaders.

Mrs. F. W. Swanton, manager of the Oregon Humane society, was quoted as saying she would order other fences cut if the situation demanded this action. She said hundreds of range animals had been saved from death by Brown's action.
