AT BRAND'S GARDENS

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"It is apparent that the council has a few business friends, one of which is an influential county official, who have strenuously opposed the site proposed by me many months ago. I want to say to the citizens of Roseburg that I secured a dumping ground which is situated four miles west of the city, and to my notion, and also that of capable citizens, the proper solution of the dumping ground situation. This ground has over six hundred feet along the river and consists of five or six acres of land and it managed under proper regulations would not damage anybody. The City Council looked the matter over and nothing further developed. A few of our citizens wanted to dump a few cans on this property owned by me, and were told by parties improving the road in that vicinity that if they did so it would cost them a fine of \$25.00, although I am the sole owner of this piece of property."

"There was a man from Medford who came before the city council with a proposition to take over the city dump. He proposed to furnish a bond in the sum of \$500 to show his good faith in the performance of his duties, and also would look after the dump free of charge and do the city hauling which at the present time is costing the city \$20 per month, and offered to enter into a contract with the city of Roseburg to perform the duties as city dump man and to comply with the laws of the state of Oregon regarding such matters and under the supervision of the state board of health, also that nothing would go over the dump that was not burned, first and no soil or deleterious matter would be mixed with the dumpings, as he proposed to cook the same and feed to his hogs, 50 or 60 in number, the hogs to be located in another place. This party was before the common council on two different occasions but no action was taken."

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MAYOR MAKES STATEMENT ON DUMP GROUNDS

a thorough cleaning of the grounds and the burying of all exposed refuse, but construction of an incinerator, sufficient in size to handle all garbage and inflammable material, and equipped with apparatus to prevent objectionable odors during the process of burning is a necessity if permanent relief is to be afforded.

Removal Proposed

Mayor Hoover has for some time been advocating moving the dump grounds to a location four miles west of Roseburg on the Melrose road. The county court, however, has declared that an injunction will be secured if the city should attempt such a change, while the residents of Melrose and other communities west of town have made strenuous objection.

The mayor has purchased the land, which he proposes shall be used, and offers to donate it to the city in the following statement, issued this morning:

"To the citizens of the city of Roseburg, and more especially to those citizens who are most affected by the city dumping grounds now situated in the corporate limits of the city, I have, as I have said, a dumping ground almost in the center of the beautiful city of Roseburg, which is no doubt an undisputed menace to the city, regarding public health in the dumping of deleterious and animal matter to the extent that the inhabitants in that vicinity if such a nuisance be allowed to continue, or be maintained in the future as has been in the past some will be compelled to vacate their premises to seek relief for the summer."

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
