County Agricultural News

(By J. C. LEEDY, County Agent.)

When Are Bartlett Pears Ripe?
Bartlett pears should be harvested green to develop best quality, according to C. L. Long, horticulture specialist. If allowed to turn yellow on the tree, eating quality, canning quality, and keeping quality are all injured. Such fruit ripens quickly and is shy of juiciness. It is subject to core-breakdown, and when canned is gritty in texture.

Time of picking is definitely determined by a pressure tester, commonly known as the "iron thumb." The Oregon tester has a plunger 7-16 of an inch in diameter; and the federal or Balluff tester has one 5-16 of an inch in diameter. Unpeeled Bartlett testing 22 to 26 pounds with the Oregon tester, or peeled fruit testing 28 to 36 pounds with the federal one will attain the highest quality in Oregon. Three or four readings on each of ten or twelve representative fruits are sufficiently conclusive. Free tests are made at the office of the county agent.

Color of skin, size of fruit, color of seeds and ease of separation from the spur are unreliable tests of harvest time.

Fruit upon heavily loaded Bartlett trees, although smaller, is ready to harvest as much as twelve days ahead of fruit upon lightly loaded trees.

Bartlett's harvested at the right ripeness and placed in storage at once in a temperature of 30 degrees to 35 degrees F. will keep twenty-five to forty days. They should be taken from this low temperature and ripened at 60 degrees to 70 degrees F. for real quality.

Storage sealed is usually associated with fruit ripened in low temperature and core-breakdown with late picking.

Prune Dusters
A number of mechanical dusters have been purchased by the prune growers in order that rapid work may be done in dusting with fine sulphur for the control of brown rot.

Bussanark Brothers of Melrose recently ordered a Niagara duster, fitted for attachment to a tractor, for use on their 90-acre prune orchard. George C. Bulley, Garden Valley fruit grower, has been successfully using a similar machine for dusting pears and walnuts. W. A. Burr & Sons, who own and operate 80 acres of orchard on the Curry estate, purchased a duster of equipment, as has F. Fortin, Oakland prune grower.

Sheep and Wool Outlook
Of interest to Douglas county sheepmen is the following from the 1929 Midsummer Sheep and Wool Outlook of the U. S. department of agriculture:

Marketing and slaughter of lambs during the next ten months are expected to be no larger than in the corresponding period of 1928-29, but are likely to be above those of other recent years. While the high level of consumer demand for lamb of the past six months may not be maintained, any falling off that may occur is not likely to be sufficient to affect lamb prices materially. An active demand for feeder lambs is expected this fall.

World wool production in 1929-30 will probably be at least as large as that of 1928-29. Demand for wool in this country is expected to be well maintained and some improvement in the demand in foreign countries may occur within the year. The long-time outlook suggests the need for caution in regard to further expansion in the sheep industry. Further expansion of the sheep industry in Oregon seems inadvisable at this time except under special circumstances. Most of the available sheep range is already well stocked, higher prices for hay and feed are in prospect, and the long-time outlook does not indicate a continuance of the high prices for lambs and wool which have prevailed during recent years. The short-time market situation, however, appears fairly favorable because of the relatively high prices for other meats, the demand for feeders, and because some improvement in wool prices may occur before the end of the year.

Fall Eggs Stabilize Prices
Poultrymen, by careful attention to the breeding and management of their laying flocks, have effected a definite change in the egg market. According to H. L. Shrader of the United States department of agriculture, this is evident as to both seasonal and annual production.

Governorship Sought by 7 Texas Democrats

Activities Echo Bolting From Al Smith—Republicans to Hold Primaries

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 16.—(A. P.)—Texas' political spectrum this year reveals a situation perhaps unparalleled in state politics—seven democratic candidates for governor a year ahead of the primaries. Friends of Gov. Dan Moody are urging him to try for a third term. The field of gubernatorial aspirants includes Barry Miller of Dallas, now lieutenant governor; Thomas B. Love, state senator of Dallas; Miss Katie Daffan of Ennis; Oscar F. Holcombe, former mayor of Houston; Gregory Hatch, state treasurer; E. G. Saylor of Dallas and T. N. Mauritz of Ganado.

Other prospective candidates, including Earle M. Mayfield, former United States senator, and Pat M. Neff, former governor, eventually may bring the entry total to an even dozen.

This field already commands an advance surge of political interest. Senator Love, who bolted Alfred E. Smith's camp last fall and turned about face to lead the campaign that put Texas in the republican column for the first time in history, has announced his candidacy on an "anti-Tammany" platform. Love was opposed to Barry Miller in the last primary when

Miller, who also seeks the executive chair, was running for lieutenant-governor. Love later withdrew after several county committees refused to print his name on official ballots because he openly declared he would not support Governor Smith.

Considerable speculation also centers on what attitude the state democratic committee will take toward Love. That group gave notice last November that all democrats who scratched the general election ticket would not only be denied ballot positions as candidates in the 1930 primary, but also would not be permitted to vote.

Next July's primary will be the second in history for Texas republicans. State laws require that 100,000 votes be cast for a party's candidate for governor in the last preceding election before a primary may be held.

Only once before, in 1927, have the republicans held a primary. Last year the republican gubernatorial candidate received 120,000 votes.
