CHURCH ISSUE OF CAMPAIGN OF 1928 ECHOES IN BOSTON

BOSTON, Aug. 16.—Former Mayor James M. Curley today declared that he would seek to have national leaders of the republican party summoned before the Suffolk county grand jury in an effort to obtain a criminal indictment against Louis R. Liggett, Massachusetts member of the republican national committee. Curley indicated that President Hoover might be included among those he would ask to have summoned. Curley today visited the office of District Attorney William Foley to ask permission to go before the grand jury and testify concerning statements made by Liggett about Curley's activities in the last presidential election. He declared that there was "not a word of truth" in charges made by Liggett that Curley, a Roman Catholic, was responsible for the circulation of anti-Catholic literature during the campaign for the purpose of damaging the republican party here. In the absence of District Attorney Foley, Curley conferred with an assistant and arrangements were made for Foley to discuss the case with Curley next Thursday. Curley told newspapermen that he would ask that summonses be issued for Mrs. Mabel W. Willbrandt, High School Cannon, Jr., or Virginia and Dr. Hubert Work, former chairman of the republican national committee.

VENEZUELAN LADY OFFERS KIN. GEMS TO HELP REBELS

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Senora Luisa Elena Delgado, attractive wife of General Ramon Delgado, who is reported to have been killed leading the government in Venezuela, invited Queen Isabella in offering her jewels for a cause dear to her heart. Senora Delgado also offered her husband and eighteen-year-old son to the cause of Venezuelan liberation from the Gomez regime. General Delgado is supposed to have been killed but the son escaped to Granada, a British island. General Delgado is said to have been the chief leader of the revolutionary movement. General Delgado was at one time in President Gomez's cabinet and was head of a great transportation company. Sixteen years ago he was thrown into prison. Two years ago he was released and went immediately to Paris, where plans were laid for the movement against the present regime in Venezuela. He had the assistance of his wife, who was regarded as one of the handsomest women in Venezuela and had suffered no more because of her husband's imprisonment than she shared his hatred of the Gomez government. Senora Delgado is still in Paris.

NEURER SILENT ON RUMOR OF JOB AT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—An interview here today between George Neurer, federal district attorney at Portland, Ore., and Attorney-General W. D. Mitchell failed to produce any additional information as to whether Neurer is to assume a post in the department of justice here. Both he and Mitchell refused to comment on reports that the Portland prosecutor will become an assistant attorney-general succeeding Mrs. Mabel Walker Willbrandt in charge of prohibition enforcement. Neurer is expected to confer with the attorney-general again while here, and may call on President Hoover at the White House Friday. He will be in Washington for several days.

TEXTILE STRIKERS WILL RETURN, PENDING PARLEY

MANCHESTER, Eng., Aug. 16.—Half a million workers will return to their tasks on Monday and the wheels of Lancashire's 1,500 cotton mills will start turning after a stoppage of three full weeks. An eleventh-hour conference last night between representatives of the striking operatives and the employers resulted in an agreement to submit to arbitration the employers' demand for an all-around reduction in wages of 12.32 per cent. In the meantime work will be resumed on Monday and the old rate of wages will be paid pending the decision of the arbitration court.

FRAUD VIA MAILS CHARGED TO EASTERN DEFENDANT

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 16.—Elmer S. Huckins, Sr., head of a mysterious business enterprise in which hundreds of middle western women were reported to have placed large sums at an interest rate of 26 per cent, surrendered today at the United States district attorney's office. He had been sought on a warrant charging use of the mails to defraud. Bond for Huckins was set at \$25,000. He was unable to raise that amount here but promised to furnish bond at Oshkosh, Wis., where his wife will meet him. And now we'll have the new banana song, "Hanging Out With the Bunch."

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LARGEST LIQUOR RING OF NATIONAL CAPITAL SMASHED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Eight men have been arrested and four others are being sought by prohibition agents and police in a roundup of what they describe as the biggest liquor ring that ever operated in the capital. All are charged with conspiracy to violate the prohibition act, and seven of those arrested are at liberty under bonds ranging from \$2,500 to \$5,000. Six, including Herbert Glassman, proprietor of a restaurant and two garages, surrendered upon learning they had been named in the warrants. Glassman's garages are alleged to have been used as depots for reception and distribution of intoxicants. He and the others are accused in the warrants of conspiring between April 1, 1928, and August 14, 1929, to violate the provisions of the Volstead act by bringing whiskey and other intoxicants designed for beverage purposes into the district of Columbia in trucks and automobiles which were received at the garages. Possession, sale and transportation of liquor are charged, and nine overt acts are alleged to have been committed by different members of the group. Preliminary hearings have been set for next Thursday.

Hyde was placed in the county jail at Newkirk and charged with "attempt and conspiracy to kidnap, rob and kill by poisoning."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Eight men have been arrested and four others are being sought by prohibition agents and police in a roundup of what they describe as the biggest liquor ring that ever operated in the capital. All are charged with conspiracy to violate the prohibition act, and seven of those arrested are at liberty under bonds ranging from \$2,500 to \$5,000. Six, including Herbert Glassman, proprietor of a restaurant and two garages, surrendered upon learning they had been named in the warrants. Glassman's garages are alleged to have been used as depots for reception and distribution of intoxicants. He and the others are accused in the warrants of conspiring between April 1, 1928, and August 14, 1929, to violate the provisions of the Volstead act by bringing whiskey and other intoxicants designed for beverage purposes into the district of Columbia in trucks and automobiles which were received at the garages. Possession, sale and transportation of liquor are charged, and nine overt acts are alleged to have been committed by different members of the group. Preliminary hearings have been set for next Thursday.
