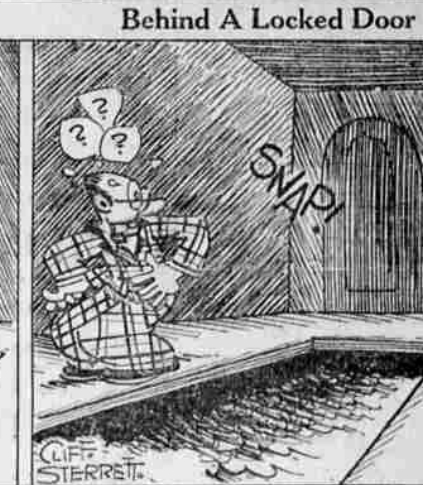

NATIONAL HEAD SONS OF VETERANS VISITS ROSEBURG

About 75 members of the Sons of Union Veterans and allied organizations visited Roseburg yesterday, the occasion being a visit of the national commander of the order, D. B. Bowley.

The meeting was held at the armory, where the local ladies auxiliary served dinner at 12:30, which was followed by musical work, during which time three candidates were initiated into the order.

At 2:30 an adjournment was taken to enable members of the order to attend the funeral of F. M. Sebring, a late veteran of the Civil war.

Later in the afternoon the members assembled at the armory to listen to a message from the national commander.

During the afternoon Mrs. Zona Latta of Marshfield was appointed state press correspondent by the national commander.

The meeting was presided over by State Commander J. P. Burkhart, of Marshfield, who headed the delegation of visitors. A visit to the state soldiers' home closed the day's activities, and the visitors left for their homes in Coos county late in the evening.

Officers elected are: H. O. Pargeter, Roseburg, first vice president; Ray S. Keimig, Astoria, second vice president, and R. A. Schramm, Portland, secretary. O. C. Foster, Medford, and R. Foster, of Baker, were named to the executive committee.

The selection of the next convention city and the date of the session was left to the executive committee, which will hold a meeting in Portland in December.
