

BOB JUBB DEFEATS BLACKWELL IN MAIN EVENT AT OAKLAND

Towel Thrown Into Ring in 6th Round After Eugene Man Hits Canvas Fourth Time.

Bob Jubb, Portland welterweight, decisively outslugged Joe Blackwell of Eugene in the main event of the Oakland rodeo fight card last Saturday night and won on a technical knockout in the sixth round, when a towel fluttered into the ring from Blackwell's corner after the Eugenean had gone to the canvas for the fourth time.

Blackwell was a sure loser after the first round, the only stage of the battle in which he held Jubb on even terms. Living up to advance notices as an aggressive mauler, Jubb never ceased carrying the argument to Blackwell and was never in danger. In the second round, Blackwell took a nine count from a stiff jolt on the jaw. He barely managed to weather the third round and was about to repeat in the fourth when he went down the second time, five seconds before the song sounded to save him. Jubb scored the third knockdown in the fifth within less than ten seconds of the bell, which, however, found Blackwell back on his feet. In the sixth round Blackwell had nothing left but his abundant nerve after Jubb flattened him in the first mixup, and the hopelessly beaten fighter was spared further punishment when the towel went into the ring after the referee had tolled off six seconds.

Blackwell's weight was announced as 153 and Jubb's as 150. Charles Tower, promoter of the card, was the third man in the ring. Spectators totaled around 300.

All Lighter Men Win

As in Jubb's case, all of the other outweighed principals on the night's card scored victories, although one was loudly protested by some of the ringworms. This was the six-round semi-final between Mahr Reymers of Lakeview, former Roseburg high school boy and Sammy Goldstein of Vancouver, Wash. Goldstein, at 142, had a weight advantage of nine pounds. Both boys were originally programmed to meet opponents of their own weight, but when this arrangement collapsed they were matched against each other as a last-minute expedient. With his big weight margin and reasonably safe from serious harm from his lighter opponent, Goldstein played the good sport by allowing Reymers to carry the fight to him throughout, halting him when necessary with an accurate lighting left hook. On the strength of creditable aggressiveness, and in accordance with ring custom governing such a showing, Reymers was awarded the decision, the unpopularity of which was attested by a chorus of boos that mingled with the cheering.

Tiger McDonald, 117 pounds, of Lakeview, sparred with Bunny Dotson, 120 1/2, of Portland, for the first round, and in the second smothered the heavier youth with a volley of rights and lefts, putting him down twice in that frame to win by the knockout route.

Judd Pankey, local lad, went in to the curtain earlier against Harold Wright, Chillicothe Indian, who gave at least ten pounds in weight. The Indian won at the end of the second round, which found Judd draped over the ropes, too ill from body punishment to continue. Judd shaded the young brave in the first round by superior aggressiveness and more effective slugging. Heeding the advice of his board of strategy, the redskin devoted all of his efforts in the second round to Judd's midsection, and when the battering was over Judd was done. It was later explained that Judd was partly ill when he went into the fight, consenting to appear solely to help out on an upset program.

ROSEBURG WINS CLOSE GAME FROM MYRTLE CREEK

The Roseburg All-Star baseball team defeated Myrtle Creek yesterday at Canyonville by a score of 10 to 6, making the fifth victory in the last six games. Zimrick and Markham, of the Roseburg team, contributed to the victory by three doubles and two three-baggers. The game was quite close and very few errors were made. Kravenek pitched steady ball for the locals and the Myrtle Creek team was unable to launch its hits, and after the second inning was unable to get more than one run across in any inning.

Roseburg started off with a rush and secured three runs in the

first inning on three long hits and an error. Runs were also secured in the second and third. Myrtle Creek got two runs in the second and one in the third. Roseburg scored no more until the sixth when four runs crossed the plate.

This was Roseburg's last game for the season. The All-Stars won 7 and lost 6 for a percentage of .538.

BOY SLAYS FATHER TO SAVE MOTHER

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 19.—The fatal shooting last Saturday of Penn S. Howard, wealthy automobile distributor, by his 12-year-old son, Richard, with a .22 calibre rifle was ordered to be investigated by a coroner's jury today. The shooting was described as having been done by the boy in defense of his mother, who, in a family quarrel, was being choked and beaten by her allegedly drink-crazed husband.

District Attorney Byron Fitts, who made a personal investigation of the tragedy, termed the shooting as an "apparently justifiable homicide."

ATHLETICS, YANKS LOSE IN SUNDAY'S LEAGUE CONTESTS

The Athletics will lead over the Yankees for at least another day. Two home runs and a double by Jimmy Foss failed to save Moose Grove in a pitcher's battle against Sammy Gray at St. Louis yesterday, and the Browns won by 4 to 3.

The situation in the standing of the clubs remained the same as the Yankees permitted Ted Lyons to pitch and bat the White Sox to a 3 to 2 decision.

Foss's two drives, each made with the bases empty, were his twenty-ninth and thirtieth of the season, and placed him second to Ruth in the American league scramble.

Ed Morris turned in the eighth successive complete game for the Red Sox pitching staff by hurling the Bostonians to a 5 to 4 victory over Owen Carroll in eleven innings at Detroit yesterday. This constitutes a season's record for the major leagues.

Cleveland fell upon Garland Braxton with great force in the fourth and the sixth innings to trim the Senators by 8 to 1 in the series opener in the Ohio city.

LEO LOMSKI AND MICKEY WALKER TO BATTLE TONIGHT

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—At the municipal stadium Philadelphia, tonight Mickey Walker, king of world middleweights, tangles in a ten round bout with Leo Lomski, the deadly body-puncher from Aberdeen, Wash. Mickey's crown will not be involved but the bout may go far toward determining the next light heavyweight champion. Tommy Loughran, matched with Jack Sharkey in the big heavyweight battle of the fall, soon is to relinquish his 175-pound championship and Walker already has let it be known he intends to claim the crown. Lomski long has been considered a leading challenger for that title.

Two of the leading heavyweights in the business, W. L. Young Stribling and Jimmy Maloney of Boston are to see action in widely separated cities tonight. At Kansas City, Stribling meets Joe Sekyra of Dayton while Maloney is facing Ricardo Bertazzola, of Italy, at Braves field, Boston. Both bouts are set for ten rounds.

GRAF ZEPPELIN ENDS LONGEST HOP OF CAREER

bust of Baron Ehrenfeld, there was no freight other than 50,000 pieces of mail, the revenue from which brought the Zeppelin near as many dollars.

Throughout the Graf's flight from Friedrichshafen communication was maintained almost constantly with either European stations, Asiatic stations, or finally, Japanese stations, so that hardly for an hour was any one unaware of the Zeppelin's location. Most of the messages from aboard the

Graf were signed "all's well aboard."

Treat for Japan

While immense crowds of excited Japanese broke again and again through police and military cordons, Dr. Hugo Eckener and Admiral Takarabe, Japanese minister of the navy, exchanged formal felicitations on the field.

Before landing at Kasumigaura field, the Graf made a courtesy flight over Tokyo and Yokohama to satisfy the curiosity of the people. It was a spectacle never before witnessed in the Orient, not even in Japan where modernization has been so rapid since the middle of the last century.

No airship as big as the Graf ever cruised the skies of the empire of the Rising Sun. Three navy blimps are the nearest approximations to her ever seen in Japan.

By a trick of fate the Graf was stowed away in a hangar built from German reparations payments.

FIRES CONTINUE TO SWEEP TIMBER IN THREE STATES

SEATTLE, Aug. 19.—Stubborn forest fires in eastern Washington, Idaho and Montana, aided by high winds and dry weather, continued to claim the services of almost 10,000 men today, although fires in the Puget sound region were being quenched by rain which stopped falling early yesterday.

The Chelan national forest in central Washington, scene of desperate fire fighting during the past week, blazed with renewed energy despite a light rain.

A 35-mile an hour gale was blowing a huge fire north over Graves mountain toward Dead Man creek basin near Kettle falls in northeastern Washington. Fifty men were sent to fight the mountain creek fire which has burned over between 45,000 and 50,000 acres. The blaze started at Dollar mountain.

Forest fires in Shastacounty, northern California, were conquered after one burned over 450 acres in the Shasta national forest.
