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DRUMMERBOY OF CIVIL WAR SEEKS FORMER FOEMAN

ATLANTA, Aug. 20.—If a drummerboy who wore the gray in the war between the states reads this, or he receives the word, it probably will mean a friendship enduring through the remaining years for him and a blue clad boy who met as foes in the sixties on a southern battlefield.

Postmaster E. K. Large has received a letter from W. D. Christian of Gouster, Ohio, the Union soldier, asking the help locate the gray drummerboy to whose lips he pressed his canteen as the latter lay wounded at the battle of Atlanta July 22, 1865.

"It would do my soul good to hear from that boy," the northern veteran said. Disavowing any malice for soldiers of the Confederacy, he wishes to become the southern's friend.

"As well as I can remember there came a lull in the battle," the letter recounted. "I heard him cry out, 'soldier, won't you give me a drink.' I asked my captain if I could fall out of rank and give that little rebel drummerboy a drink. He said, 'yes.'"

"I took a tin can off my haversack holding about a quart, filled it full of water out of my own canteen, held it to his mouth, and he drank it all."

Mr. Christian said he believed the Confederate soldier was in the vicinity of Atlanta. When they met on the battlefield he was 18, and he thinks the Confederate boy could not have been more than 15.

MOST WOMEN LAWMAKERS PROHIBITION SUPPORTERS

EVANSTON, Ill., Aug. 20.—Women help make the laws of all but 10 states in the union, and a majority are "dry."

A survey by the Women's Christian Temperance union shows that women sit in the legislatures of 33 states. They report that 54 out of 75 women representing 29 states are listed as dry. Sentiment of representatives in nine states is not ascertained.

Twenty-eight feminine legislators are members of the W. C. T. U., whose headquarters are here. Strangely enough, thinks the W. C. T. U., all the women lawmakers in the "wet" states of Illinois, Massachusetts and New York are dry.

However, the one woman member of the Georgia legislature is classed as a wet, and the lone Nebraska solon is referred to as "not in favor of prohibition."

The W. C. T. U. mentions that Mrs. Mabel Walker Wilbrandt, until recently the assistant United States attorney general in charge of prohibition prosecution, is a member.

RICH INDIAN WOMAN SUED BY 3RD HUSBAND

MIAMI, Okla., Aug. 20.—Mrs. Anna Beaver Bear Hallam, said to be the wealthiest woman of the Quapaw Indian tribe, has been sued for divorce and \$250,000 alimony by her third husband, F. L. Hallam, a white man. Hallam alleged his wife beat him while he was asleep and on one occasion attacked him with a revolver.

In his petition Hallam listed his wife's property as including \$650,000 in cash which is held in trust by the bureau of Indian affairs, and real estate in Miami and Ottawa county, Oklahoma. The
