JIMMY WALKER
FACES HOT FIGHT
TO KEEP HIS JOB

Republican Rival for N. Y. Mayoralty, La Guardia, Knows Politics and Is a Go-Getter.

Colorful Personality and Popularity of Tammany Man Meets Ability of High Order.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—It gradually is penetrating the inner consciousness of New York's citizens that they have a fight to settle in picking the next occupant of the mayor's chair.

At least the signs by which such things are judged point that way, now that the battle lines for the mayoralty campaign have been drawn. A scrap between a son of Ireland and one whose ancestors hail from Italy should equal in intensity anything the prize ring develops.

And that is exactly what is in the offing.

It's dapper, witty James J. Walker, who wears the colors of Tammany, against Fiorello H. La Guardia, fighting liberal congressman, in whose veins flows the blood of Italian ancestors.

Test for Tammany
The mayoralty campaign will be another test of Tammany. It is 12 years since Anti-Tammany candidate was successful in overcoming the Tammany organization.

In securing the unofficial nomination of the republicans to test strength with Tammany, La Guardia fulfilled an ambition which he has nurtured for many years. Schooled in the art of battle, both in the army and the political ring, he meets a worthy foe in the champion of the Tammany organization.

Walker Colorful Figure
Four years ago Jimmy Walker, lawyer, sportsman and politician, gained the mayor's chair after trouncing John F. Hyland, seeking nominations as the official Tammany candidate.

In the four years in which he has drawn his pay check from the city, which by the way totals \$3,000 a year, Jimmy Walker probably has become known personally to more people than any of his predecessors.

His wandering feet have carried him to many climes and he has raised welcoming visitors to a city. His radiant personality, his quick wit and facile sarcasm, his splendid oratory, his keen sense of humor in the public eye and gained for him a reputation as a showman with few equals.

Aside from the potential vote getting value of Jimmy Walker as a personality, his supporters have much to expect "pointed with pride" to what they regard as 40 accomplishments of his administration.

La Guardia Real Fighter
Although past history seems to favor the smiling Jimmy, he has a rough road ahead of him in beating La Guardia.

La Guardia is the fighting son of a fighting man and grew up in an atmosphere of war. In an army camp. He has had a varied career but his forte has been politics.

Theodore Roosevelt sent him abroad in the consular service and he came back to study law and become the deputy attorney general of New York state.

He became familiar with the city's affairs as president of the board of aldermen and probably has the unequalled distinction of being elected to congress in successive terms as a republican and a socialist.

He waited no longer than to register his vote for war before he left his seat in congress and became a private in the army. He returned at the end of the World war with a major's insignia, after an active career in the aviation corps.

La Guardia knows the value of drama in politics and with Walker on the other side the race should steal much of the brilliance of Broadway during the pre-election days.

WALKER DEFEATS
LOMSKI DESPITE
WEIGHT HANDICAP

Decision in Slashing Bout Places Victor Nearer the Top of Light Heavy Class.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 20.—Mickey Walker, ruler of the middleweight realm, was a step nearer the light heavyweight throne today by virtue of his convincing victory over Leo Lomski, the reigning light heavy, of Aberdeen, Wash.

Walker took the Aberdeen champion handily in 10 abiding rounds at the municipal stadium last night, not by a knockout as Manager Jack Kearns had predicted, but by a comfortable margin.

Walker, former welterweight king and holder of the middleweight crown, spotted Lomski six and three-quarters pounds, but more than overcame the weight handicap by his ring generalship and punishing punches. The Associated Press score sheet gave Walker six rounds and Lomski three. The tenth was even.

Both fighters were in splendid condition and from the opening bell there was never a lull. At times Walker ran into Lomski's wildling right. Mickey always came back and belted the Aberdeen blonde soundly in the third and seventh and in the ninth. Walker had the westerner on the verge of a knockout, but Lomski weathered the storm. The champion too was badly stung at times and was forced back, but for the most part he was always boring in and willing to slug it out too.

Science played little part in the battle. It was a rushing slashing fight all the way.

Stribling Wins
KANSAS CITY, Aug. 20.—"Young" Stribling, Georgia heavyweight, added another victory to his growing string in a 10-round bout here last night when his body attack proved too much for Moe Sekyra, blonde Bohemian, of Dayton, Ohio.

The Oklan fought gamely but was no match for Stribling when the latter got under way. The sixth round saw the bout made interesting by Stribling's aggressiveness and the contest ended with the Georgian felling Sekyra viciously to the body.

Stribling outweighted Sekyra 180 to 176.

CHUCK WIGGINS
BATTLES POLICE
WHILE ON SPREE

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 20.—Chuck Wiggins, veteran local heavyweight boxer, and known to thousands of ring fans as the "Hoosier playboy" because of his flistic prowess on a large part of the Indianapolis police force last night and took the count. As a result he may not be able to go through with his scheduled ten-round bout with Al Friedman, Boston heavyweight hero Tuesday night.

Wiggins was badly beaten before he was finally jailed. The trouble started when his machine struck a police car. After knocking down the officer who attempted to arrest him, Wiggins was taken to the jail.

1ST TIME PITCHER,
WIN DOUBLE HEADER

Victim Is Pittsburgh, Now Nine Games in Rear of Cubs—Athletics, Yankees Win.

The Phils trimmed the Pirates yesterday in a doubleheader by 7 to 6 and 8 to 5, and left Pittsburgh's flag hopes decidedly flat.

The double reverse dropped the Pirates to a position nine games behind the Cubs, who led in New York yesterday.

From the debris of the Pittsburgh pennants dream emerged a young Philadelphia pitching recruit who hoisted high his standard in the afternoon of his big league debut, a hero for a day if no more. But in the vicinity of North Broad street and the railroad tracks they will tell you that Harry Smythe of Asheville and the Sally League has come to the big time to stay.

This southpaw recruit from the land which gave Nap Rucker to the major league tossed back the slogging Pirates hitless in five innings of the two games yesterday. He took charge of the opener in the sixth with the teams tied at 6 to 6, and blazed away faultlessly as the Phillies gave him a margin of one run with which he won.

In American League
In the second game he pitched

only the last round after official credit for the victory had been handed out to Bob McGraw for the reason that McGraw was on hand when the winning rally was unleashed.

The Mack's got back into their winning stride in the American league campaign, downing the Browns by 8 to 2, behind Bill Shores and evening the series. The Yankees also won, and the lead of the Athletics remained unchanged at thirteen games.

The run of complete games by Red Sox pitchers was halted at nine. After Milton Gaston had hurled the Bostonians to a 3 to 2 triumph over the Tigers in the first game at Detroit yesterday, Jack Russell gave way under pressure of Bengal bats in the nightcap. He yielded the reins to Dobson in the sixth as the home team won by 5 to 2.
