RODEO'S MONEY TANGLE MAY BE TAKEN TO COURT

closed and turned the balance, which he states amounted to \$13 or \$20 over to his cashier.

Questioned by Attorney Eddy whether or not an attempt was being made to "black" the gate receipts, Garrison became quite heated in his replies, the lawyer and the witness nearing a clash over the term "blat" which Garrison injected in reply to the attorney. The banker denied knowledge of the method of handling the gate receipts or the amount involved, and when questioned regarding whether or not proper banking procedure had been followed, declared that it had but that the matter had been left to the cashier and that, as president he has made no investigation. A few checks, to his knowledge, he said, had been paid from the gate receipts, but he did not know the number or amount.

Money Went Into Bank R. D. Bridges, a member of the Oakland Gobbler, stated that the organization had contracted with Farleigh, leasing him the grounds and agreeing to assist in staging the rodeo. Several of the members, he stated, aided as gatemen, and that they turned the money over to the representative of the bank who, accompanied by a guard of traffic officers, took the funds each afternoon to the bank. The money was placed in a sack and kept in the vault, the witness said. Some payments were made out of the sack and the checks put in place of the money paid out, it was stated.

He stated that he knew that the bank had placed money to Farleigh's credit and that it was understood that deductions were to be made to cover the funds advanced. He stated that it was his understanding that all of the money received belonged to Farleigh and that the Gobbler had no financial interest.

H. E. Mahoney, former president of the Gobbler, stated that the organization had no financial interest. "The Gobbler were dead," he stated, "and they should have remained dead. We'd have been better off."

Apparently court action will be necessary to secure an accounting of the funds.

been unable to receive any check on the money taken in but that he has receipts for more than \$2,000, while his checks reach only \$1,752, yet he has been informed that his balance has been exhausted and that he has no funds in the bank and his checks have been returned marked "N. S. P."

The rodeo came to an end Sunday when Farleigh announced to the crowd that the finals in the bucking contest would be held. The champion riders were selected and put on an exhibition for which they received nothing, donating their services, the manager states. It was planned to hold races Monday, he states, but these were called off. He also claims that his concessions, from which he was to have received \$295 were ordered closed and that he has had no account from that source. His scheduled Sunday and Monday night dances were also closed, he declares, but on Monday night a dance was organized, no admission being charged, but a collection was taken, which failed to pay expenses and Farleigh "forked up" the difference, according to his statement.

The whole case centers around the sack that was kept in the vault. The Gobbler claim that the gate receipts belonged to Farleigh, but apparently no check was made of the amounts received. Farleigh holds receipts that he claims represent deposits, while the bank declares that he exhausted his account. Checks, it is claimed, were paid out of the sack, without passing through the regular channels. Some payments were made out of the sack and the checks put in place of the money paid out, it was stated.

Farleigh Starts Probe In an interview given today, Medoc Johnnie Farleigh, manager of the Umpqua Roundup, stated that his riders and helpers at the roundup are all his friends and have taken his word for it that the receipts of the roundup were not made available to his checking account at the bank. "What was done with the receipts from the roundup I do not know," Farleigh said. "I know that they were taken to the bank and notations given me showing the respective amounts. I thought they were placed on deposit and subject to my check. I am taking steps legally to find out what was done with the money and know that the facts that will be uncovered will bear out my statement."
