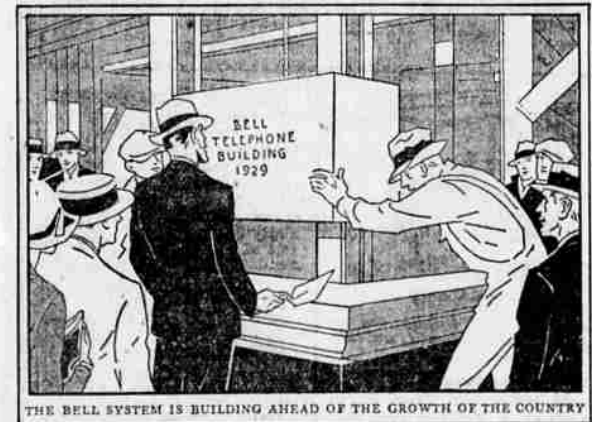

WHITE SOX DEFEAT MACKMEN; TIGERS SHUT OUT YANKS

All the big winners in American league history have felt, at least once in their respective seasons of super-greatness, the sting of a defeat. The Chicago White Sox, the champions of 1929, qualified under his rule of baseball fate yesterday—presuming that the A's not only will win but will win by a margin great enough to place them in a class with the Red Sox of 1912 and the Yankees of 1923 and 1927.

Condie Mack's first run of three straight losses for the current season was accomplished in Chicago yesterday when the White Sox nosed out Mose Grove in the ninth by 4 to 3.

The White Sox already have qualified as the Jinx team not only of Groves, but also of the Athletics themselves. The Chicago victory yesterday brought Blackburn's boys up to within one of a tie against the A's in fifteen games, and left the coming champions faced by the necessity of taking at least the old game in the remaining seven to win the season's series from the lowly Sox.

Dixon 157½. Nine thousand people paid approximately \$15,000 to see the fight.

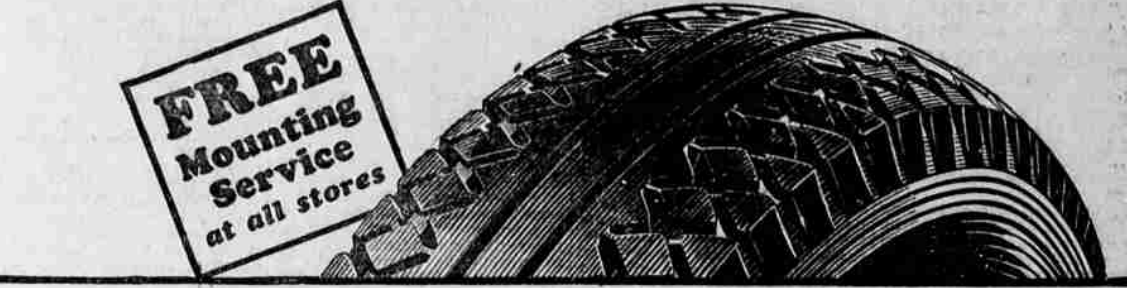

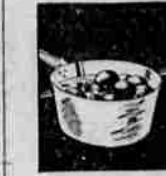

Good vegetables deliciously cooked promote health



A NOTED scientist is addressing the women of America. He is talking to them because they hold the health of the nation in their hands. It is the women who control our daily diet. Everyone knows the value of sugar sprinkled over berries, fresh pineapple and other tart, fresh fruits. And the value of sugar in preparing stewed fruits for delicious desserts.
