

NEW CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC WILL BE OPENED IN CITY

Roy Goodman, concert pianist and music instructor, has arrived in Roseburg to locate and in announcing the opening of a conservatory of music, specializing in piano and violin. Mr. Goodman comes to Roseburg from Portland, having formerly been engaged in a similar line of activity in the east.

Mr. Goodman has enjoyed wide experience as a concert pianist, radio artist and teacher. He is a graduate of the Chicago Musical college, where, he states, his work in harmony, counterpoint and composition was under the personal direction of the well known German composer Louis Victor Saar, Felix Borowski and Alexander Raab, were other of the instructors under whom he has studied.

Associated with him in the studio will be Miss Ida Frank, who will head the violin department. Her training was under Prof. Hervey Bettman, a pupil of Eugene Ysaÿe. Miss Frank has had several years of successful experience as a violin instructor.

The conservatory is to be located in the Bell building at 137 North Jackson street.

YOUTH 2½ YEARS OLD GAINS WEIGHT AS TOBACCO USER

Billy, who had been unhealthy from birth, was so weakened a year ago that his life was despaired of. It was then that the doctor suggested that he be allowed tobacco as a stimulant and possibly as an aid to creation of an appetite.

In the year that he followed, Billy has gained weight and is now apparently a normal child—but he is an inveterate smoker. His parents are trying to break the child of the habit and have reduced the amount of his smoking to two pipes a day.

BETTER BUSINESS CONDITIONS SHOWN BY JULY REPORT

The J. C. Penney Co. reports that the first six months of 1929 showed the largest net earnings in the history of the organization for the first half-year period. Net earnings from sales for the first six months of this year, after deductions for federal taxes but before preferred stock dividends, were \$3,391,147.62, with additional earnings from discounts and miscellaneous income bringing this figure up to \$3,725,075.56.

This compares with net earnings from all sources for 1928, for the same period, of \$2,978,421.35, after federal taxes but before deductions for preferred stock dividends.

Commenting on the semi-annual statement, E. C. Sams, president, said: "Sales have not only increased in total volume, but the comparative increases of individual stores have been satisfactory. While crop and industrial conditions vary in some localities, yet generally over the country we are looking forward to much better business during the balance of the year."

"That the comparative increase for old stores for the month of July was so satisfactory bears out our above statement."

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BOY LANDS FINE STEELHEAD TROUT IN SOUTH UMPQUA

While the North Umpqua river is supposed to be the country's best fishing stream, the South Umpqua is not to be entirely forgotten, according to Kenneth Starmer, 14-year-old son of S. W. Starmer, commandant of the Oregon Soldiers' Home. A couple of days ago the boy took his fishpole and floated down the river, back of the state institution, on a raft, working his way out to a riffle where he has been catching shiners and chubs. He decided to try his luck with a fly and cast out a small brown hackle. The fly had no more than hit the water until there was a big swirl and the line started screaming off the reel.

Perched on the small raft, that tipped precariously, young Starmer battled away. At times he had to throw himself down on the boards to keep from going off into the stream, and as a result was soon soaking wet, but he stayed with the fish. Desperately he wound up on the small reel that groined his arm, and only to have the fish go off on another long run. Time and again this was repeated until finally the young fisherman succeeded.

The fish, a beautiful steelhead trout, measured 27 inches and weighed 6 pounds.

REGISTRATIONS ARE POURING IN FOR TWIN ROUNDUP

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 22.—(Special)—Acceptances have been received by the Twin Roundup program committee from the mayors of a number of Oregon cities to the invitations extended to them to provide the entertainment for the morning of the Roundup day, Monday, September 2, Labor Day.

Eugene, Salem, Corvallis, Lebanon and Brownsville have already formally accepted and will be represented by their mayors and a troop of artists. Other acceptances are expected in a short time.

The program committee is leaving the nature of each city's program to the city itself, so that a variety of entertainment will be assured.

The city entertainment feature will start at 10 o'clock in the morning and will continue until noon. At noon there will be a banquet in honor of all of the mayors and their parties.

In the afternoon the twins will hold the center of the stage for several hours. There will be a parade of the twins, the judging and then the twin competitions in various contests.

Late in the afternoon there will be the program of water sports, the bathing beauty contest and various other competitions.

Registration of twins are coming in rapidly and present indications are that the entry list will be much larger than last year when 160 pairs came to Albany. Twins born in Marion county before Oregon was admitted into the Union are planning to attend Albany's Twin Roundup September 2. A letter from Robert L. Withrow, managing editor of the Curry County Reporter, to Ted Musgrave, chairman of registration, describes these twins, W. W. and W. R. Miller, as being hale

and hearty and alike as two peas. Mr. Withrow, who has known the men for two years, is obliged to examine their faces carefully to find on the cheek of one a tiny mole, a symbol of identification dear to the heart of novelists. One of the twins is expected home shortly from a prospecting trip, when he will have his hair and mustache trimmed to look exactly like that of his brother.

AIM OF SANTIAM POWER FILING NOT SHOWN AT INQUIRY

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22.—Whether an application by Edward A. O'Neill of California for a power right on the north fork of the Santiam river in Marion and Linn counties is only a speculation, or whether it is the forerunner of paper mill or other industrial development was not revealed at a conference today in the office of State Engineer Luper.

A hearing was to be held today, but on motion of L. M. Curl of Albany, attorney for O'Neill, the hearing was continued to September 24, the day following the hearing set for the Northwest Power company's application for rights on Marion lake and the North Santiam.

Mr. Curl stated that he was not authorized to reveal the purpose of the proposed development. He said, however, that members of the California firm of O'Neill Brothers & Callahan, with which Edward A. O'Neill is connected, have all been paper mill men. The O'Neills established the paper mill at Lebanon, Ore., and the firm is now interested in a paper mill in San Francisco.

Both the state fish commission and the state game commission are protesting the application, but it was evident today that they will not fight it if agreement can be made for an adequate passageway for migratory fish over a dam the company proposes to build. Curl moved for postponement because, he said, he had not been informed previously that the game commission had joined in the protest. W. O. Hadley of The Dalles, superintendent of fisheries for the game commission, was present and agreed to the postponement, as did a representative of the fish commission by telephone.

The application calls for the appropriation of 650 second feet to develop 755 horsepower. A dam 121.5 feet high and 470 feet long at the top as proposed. The estimated cost of the development is set at \$800,000.

Engineer Luper suggested to Curl that the case might be facilitated if, at the hearing September 24, he would reveal the purpose of the development. Curl replied that this would be pertinent.
