TARIFF COMMITTEE O. K. S. TWO ADDITIONAL BANS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22—Republican members of the senate finance committee today approved of commodities mined by convict labor abroad.

The present law forbids entry only to goods manufactured by convict labor.

Another revision would bar from free entry advertising matter printed and mailed abroad for American concerns for distribution to their customers in this country.

The American federation of labor contends that from 20 to 30 million pieces of such printed matter enter the United States annually, depriving American labor of this production. Firms using this method, the federation holds, not only take advantage of cheap labor abroad, but of lower mailing costs due to depreciated currencies.

ZEPPELIN STOWAWAY SENT TO JUVENILE COURT

HAMBURG, Germany, Aug. 22—Albert Buschke, stowaway aboard the Graf Zeppelin on her last flight from Friedrichshafen to Lakehurst, was sent home today for trial before the juvenile court.

Buschke, who set out to see the world in the Graf but spent most of his trip in the ship's brig and an American jail, attempted to escape from the steamer Thuringia on arriving here.

The 16-year-old boy was picked up in the harbor but was soon picked up.

out into more territory, but thus far their efforts have been without reward.

Indian and St. Louis left one camp in the Camas creek section and started down Hungry ridge to another, and their tracks were traced to a point which indicated they were headed for McFarlane creek. Soon after they disappeared it was learned that fire which had been burning on Fisher creek had jumped up over the ridge and spread on the other side, and since then that entire area has been burned over.

Camp has been established by the searchers near where the tracks were lost, and the country is being combed systematically. Forestry officials here say the search will continue until something definite is known. They continue to hope both men will be found alive.

Montana Needs Rain

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 22—More than 2,000 men today were fighting forest fires in western Montana and northern Idaho. Rain remained the only hope of saving large areas of timber from the fires which have burned over thousands of acres.

The two most serious fires, the Bald mountain fire in Idaho and the Half Moon fire near Glacier national park in Montana, still were spreading, though under partial control on portions of their front.

Resort Homes in Ashes.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 22—Serious forest fires which broke out late Thursday in the heavy timber northeast of Rock Point, summer resort, located 35 miles from Klamath Falls, destroyed fifteen summer homes, was reported under control today.

The fire, burning in the timber of the Crater lake national forest, was fought throughout the night by 100 employees of the forest service.
