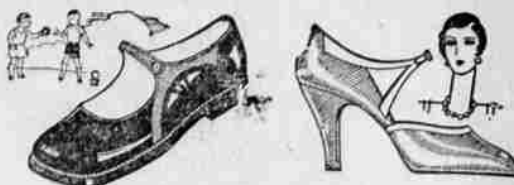

ZEPPELIN ENROUTE TO LOS ANGELES

Ishi Shibata, of the general staff of the army. They replaced four others who left the ship here after the trip from Friedrichshafen.

Northern Route Chosen
Ahead of the Graf lay a course of some 5,470 miles which, Dr. Eckener expected to cover in close to 100 hours, a schedule which, if adhered to, would bring the Zeppelin to Los Angeles at 2:13 a. m. Pacific time, Tuesday.

It was easily possible the Zeppelin would exceed this and arrive at

Los Angeles Monday evening.

The course, broadly speaking, lay northeastward from here to south of the Aleutian Islands, where the turn southward toward Seattle, Wash., would be made. From Seattle it was planned to cruise southward along the Pacific coast to Los Angeles. Dr. Eckener made it plain, however, he would vary his itinerary according to the weather conditions he encountered.

From Los Angeles Dr. Eckener planned to fly 2,500 miles to Lakehurst, N. J., completing the round the world trip he began there Wednesday night, August 1, at 10:40 p. m.

There was promise of mild tailwinds for the first part of the trans-Pacific trip. If they should last, Dr. Eckener believed he might make Los Angeles within 50 hours, or by about 6 a. m. Pacific time (9 a. m. E. S. T.) Monday, appearing over Seattle Sunday evening.

Weather Outlook Bad

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—A weather report indicating unfavorable weather conditions were developing from the Great Circle, the announced route of the Graf Zeppelin as she left Tokyo, were broadcast to Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the airship, by the United States weather bureau here today.

Storm Outriden

TOKYO, Aug. 21.—(Saturday)—The Graf Zeppelin, bound for the Pacific coast of America, wirelessly reported that she had triumphantly ridden through a sudden violent wind and lightning storm while cruising eastward about three hours after she started from Kasumigaura airport yesterday (Friday).

CONSTRUCTION OF SMITH RIVER ROAD MOVING RAPIDLY

Floyd Frear, county roadmaster, returned last night from an inspection trip into the upper Smith river district. The Shuswap national forest is building a road from Ada to connect with the county road on the North Fork of Smith River and Mr. Frear, accompanied by M. H. Durbin, the district ranger, went over the new construction, which he reports is being done in a very fine manner. The road is from 12 to 16 feet wide with frequent turnouts. The work is of extremely heavy construction, but is being done very economically, considering the type of work encountered. The county and road district are cooperating to the extent of about \$12,000, the money having been turned over to the Shuswap forest, so that the forest crew can carry the project on to completion. When finished the road will give the Smith River residents an outlet to Ada, Gardiner or Florence, the first time they have ever had road connection with the outside. Heretofore all traffic has been by boat.

WOMEN RACING FLIERS STILL LED BY LOUISE THADEN

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 23.—Louise McPhetridge Thaden of Pittsburgh, maintained her lead in the national women's air derby by landing first at the Tulsa municipal airport today from Fort Worth.

PECOS, Tex., Aug. 23.—Entrants remaining in the national women's aerial derby were reduced to 16 today when Florence Lowe Barnes, of San Marino, Calif., decided to withdraw after a thorough inspection of her damaged plane showed it could not be repaired in time for her to overtake her competitors. The decision was made after a plane had arrived from Wichita, Kansas, with parts for her craft, wrecked yesterday when the aviatix allowed the plane to run too far on the Pecos airport and crash into an automobile.

Edith Foltz of Portland, Ore., who arrived from Midland, did not start today's hop with the others. Her plane's landing gear, still weak, had to be strengthened and she was to leave later in the day. Margaret Perry of Los Angeles, who spent the night at Abilene because of illness and flew to Fort Worth this morning, was taken to a hospital with a fever. Physicians said she probably would be able to resume the flight some time today. Miss Foltz was to await the arrival of Blanche Noyes of Cleveland and both expected to leave for Wichita about noon. Mrs. Noyes' plane was damaged in a forced landing near Pecos yesterday when she discovered a spare flying suit smoldering from a cigarette butt.

"The wool market is fairly active with prices generally firm. There is no feature to the trading that is new. Western operations are practically done. Traffic thickening affects trading very little as yet."

"The manufacturing position appears to be very sound, with demand favoring worsted wools most distinctly. Repeat business is seasonally good."

"Foreign markets are dull and rather easier."

"Mohair is generally quiet, with some interest shown in original kid hair in the range of 70 to 80 cents."

Another shipment of 50 cases of Hawaiian pineapple by the steamer Willemin was reported. The fruit sells for \$6 for crates containing 20 or 24, according to size.

Eggs and butter continue firm, with the supply a little short of the demand.
