DEBT PARLEY FACES COLLAPSE; BRITON WILL NOT GIVE IN

THE HAGUE, Aug. 24.—Philip Snowden, British chancellor of the exchequer, and storm center of The Hague reparations conference, again moved into the forefront of the deliberations today with a letter to Henri Jaspar, Belgian premier, in which he declared the British delegation had exercised nearly all the patience at its command in debating Britain's demands for a large share of Young plan payments with her four wartime allies.

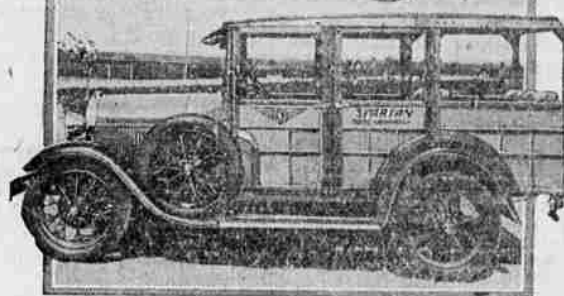
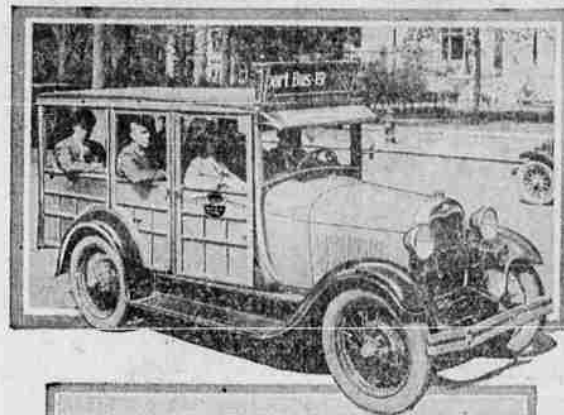
SPOKANE HAS NEW CHIEF OF POLICE

"ALL aboard for the airport" is a cry now heard frequently on the campus of the University of Michigan, where one of the new Ford station wagons is used as a conveyance for students to and from the Flo School of Flying.

Due to the ban on automobiles at the University, students interested in aeronautics—and the number is increasing rapidly—were unable to reach the flying field in private cars, and the demand for transportation became so keen that the station wagon was purchased by the flying school and placed on a regular schedule between the airport and the Michigan Union.

The example is serving to show other airports how the transportation problem to and from the city may be solved. The Spartan Aircraft Company of Tulsa, Okla., is using the Model A Ford to transport its students from the city to the auxiliary flying field located a few miles from the Tulsa Municipal Airport. The station wagon is the Model A Ford type that can be used either for passengers or hauling. It is being adopted by summer hotels, schools and seaside resorts, as well as by airports.

Officials of the Flo School of Flying report that aviation has taken a strong hold on the Michigan University students, many of whom come to the field at every opportunity for passenger rides. Others have enrolled as student fliers. The plan is to provide a means for students in the course of aeronautical engineering at the University to obtain also a practical experience in flying.
