BOARD DECIDES AGAINST BRITISH TEXTILE WORKERS

PROTECTION OF FOREST LANDS WELL ORGANIZED

(News-Review Douglas County Special)

Organized protection against forest fires again demonstrated its effectiveness in holding down fire losses, according to a compilation of fire figures just completed by the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture, for the calendar year 1928.

On the 359,498,969 acres of forest land under protection last year, fires burned over a total of 4,428,506 acres, causing damage estimated at \$5,583,629. Of the 178,855,959 acres of unprotected land 39,562,810 acres were burned over during the year, the damage being placed at \$74,350,600.

Of the 588,354,010 acres of forest land in the United States last year, the fire damage on the protected 63 1/2 per cent of the total forest area was less than one-eighth that on the unprotected 31 1/2 per cent in a striking demonstration of the value of organized protection in saving forest values, says the Forest Service.

Complete reports to the Forest Service show a total of 177,362 forest fires in the United States last year. Of these, 49,572 broke out on protected lands, while 128,362 occurred on unprotected areas.

Careless smokers were responsible for the largest number of fires on protected forest lands, causing 8,346 fires, or 20.6 per cent of the total. Incendiarism ranked next as a cause of fire, being responsible for 7,276 fires, or 17.9 per cent. Brush-burning was reported as the cause of 13.2 per cent of the fires, lightning 9.3 per cent, camp fires 9.1 per cent, railroads 8.9 per cent, lumbering 3.9 per cent, miscellaneous 9.2 per cent, and unknown 7.9 per cent.

Reports as to causes of fires on unprotected areas are too incomplete and unreliable to warrant tabulation.

The Gulf group of states had the greatest number of fires in 1928 as well as in 1927. A total of 99,120 fires on the unprotected area and 12,937 on protected lands were reported in 1928 in this group of states.

An analysis of the total proportion of the total protected area burned over in the Gulf states last year was 5.69 per cent. In the Central states, 1.63 per cent of the protected area was burned over; in the Pacific coast states, 1.44 per cent; in the Middle Atlantic states, 0.99 per cent; in the Southeastern group, 0.93 per cent; in the Lake states, 0.43 per cent; in the Northeastern group, 0.21 per cent; and in the Rocky mountain group, 0.12 per cent.

"LIFER" SEES WORLD FOR FIRST TIME IN 53 YEARS

Solitary Confinement Is Temporarily Broken by Transfer.

Fifty-three years ago, a boy of seventeen, who had murdered children even younger than himself, entered the Charleston state prison to expiate his crimes by a life of solitary confinement.

Today, Jesse H. Pomeroy, now a grizzled man of 71, was taken from behind the grim walls that had been his home to the state farm at Bridgeview, Mass.

Pomeroy arrived in an automobile, the first ride he had ever taken in a motor vehicle. During the trip his eyes were held wide by wonder and his tongue was almost speechless as he realized at what speed a modern world, hidden from him by prison walls, had moved in 53 years.

Massachusetts' historic "lifer" was disappointed at the scarcity of horses on the highways. He saw but one from the time he left Boston until he arrived at the outskirts of Bridgeview. At the state farm he faced one of his greatest surprises. There, tractors have all but displaced horses, and a lengthy explanation was necessary before he was able to understand the use of those machines.

SPEIGHT, SALEM BUTCHER, ACCUSED OF MANSLAUGHTER

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 24.—Edward (Scotty) Speight, Salem meat dealer, is charged with involuntary manslaughter in a report of the Marion county grand jury returned Friday afternoon.

Speight was held to the grand jury upon complaint of District Attorney John Carson following an inquest into the death of 2-year-old Lawrence Walker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker of Mt. Angel, in an automobile accident one mile west of Gervais on June 6. The boy was crushed to death when the car in which he was riding with Speight and Miss Helen Adams, an employee of Speight, was driving, was wrecked.

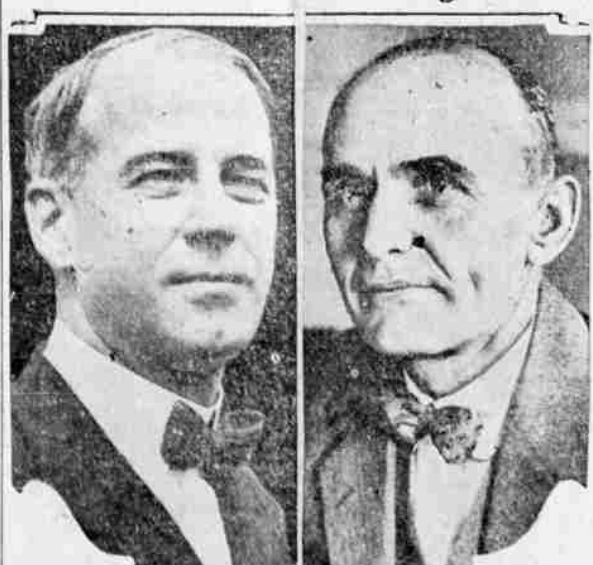
Before the coroner's jury, Miss Adams testified that she had "never seen Scotty sober," and that on the day of the accident he had drunk two plates of moonshine liquor. She blamed the accident, which occurred on a sharp turn, to Speight's constant insistence that she drive faster and that unless she did he would "put his foot on the gas."

FARM PROPERTY LOSES HEAVILY FROM JULY FIRES

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 24.—(Special)—With a total loss of \$126,378 in 62 fires, farm properties, with the single exception of the lumber industries, suffered the greatest damage in the total state losses inflicted by 132 fires during the month of July, outside of Portland, according to the analysis of incomplete fire loss reports made public by State Fire Marshal Clare A. Lee today. The July farm losses in the aggregate constituted 47 per cent of the total number of fires and 29 per cent of the volume of losses.

The total losses for the month of July amounted to \$436,252 which, with the exception of 1927, the record low-loss year for the past seven years, was \$883,000 less than that of July, 1928, and \$405,000 less than the average July loss for the previous five years. Last month's fire losses were \$229,000 in excess of those for the June previous, and \$23,000 more than for July of 1927. The state losses amounted to \$1,242,000 for the seven months of 1929 to July 31, which is \$56,000 less than for the corresponding period of 1927; \$609,000 less than the seven months of 1928, and \$605,000 below the average seven-month period for the previous five years.

Of the July, 1929, losses the lumbering industries suffered the heaviest with \$179,950 in six fires; farm properties were next with \$126,378 in 62 fires; city dwellings and contents followed with \$47,684 in 41 fires; hotels, lodgings, houses and restaurants were damaged in the total amount of \$42,000 in four fires; mercantile and other establishments suffered a loss of \$22,475 in 16 fires; dance and other classes of assembly halls were damaged to the extent of \$12,000 in three fires, and garages, filling stations, etc., \$5,525 in six fires.

Among the list of known causes held responsible for the July losses, overheated and defective stoves, furnaces and chimneys were charged with \$139,530 of the total; rubbish and smokes, \$29,289; matches and careless smokers, \$13,185; open lights and fires, \$12,200; fireworks, \$9,800, and electricity and defective wiring, \$5,020. Causes undetermined and unknown were accountable for \$208,403 of the losses.

SWIFTEST PLANES OF 4 NATIONS WILL VIE FOR TROPHY

(A. P.)—Seaplanes of four nations, with the speed of bullets built into them, will hurtle through the air here September 6 and 7 in an international assault on existing speed records.

To the swiftest will go the Schneider trophy for seaplane speed, first offered by the French sportsman and pioneer in aviation, Jacques Schneider. It is to become the permanent property of the nation which wins it three times in succession. So far no nation has been able to win it more than twice.

Twice, in 1920 and 1921, Italy captured the trophy, only to lose it the following year to Great Britain. Twice, in 1923 and 1925, it

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M'NARY PROTESTS CHERRY-FILBERT DUTY REDUCTION

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22.—Resenting action of the senate finance committee at Washington in reducing the tariff provided by the house bill on cherries and filberts, and also in failing to stand for an adequate protection on timber, Senator Charles L. McNary today sent a pointed telegram to Senator James E. Watson, chairman of the sub-committee on agricultural products of the senate finance committee.

"Before he left Washington Senator McNary was given to understand by Watson that ample opportunity would be given the agricultural interests for hearing in the senate committee deliberations.

"As a result of conversation with you," said Senator McNary's telegram to Watson, "I assumed there would be no misstatement of agricultural schedules in the house bill unless opportunity was given to the producers to be heard. In any event this is a rule of simple justice. The cherry and filbert industries have invited large investments along the coast and in the northwest, and are in need of adequate protection.

"Testimony discloses that one or two importers or processors from the city dropped in and changed the situation. The growers' diligence they presented their case at length to the house committee and without warning their interests have been sacrificed.

"The greatest resource and most important industry in the great northwest and some of the intermountain states is conversion of timber into various products. Again the committee heeded not the cry for adequate protection.

"I favor adequate protection to steel and sugar and shoes, but I do not want to stop there. I hope these subject matters have not gone beyond the control of the committee and that further reflection will develop the virtue of my protest."

ANAHEIM TOURIST NOT TALLMAN, AS SUSPECTED

He was located today on the North Bank highway by a motorcycle policeman and released after proving his identity.

Skinner registered under his own name at the Woodard Hotel, La Center, Wash., last night and aroused the suspicions of the innkeeper.

NATIVES AND LIVESTOCK DIE IN FLOOD IN INDIA

BOMBAY, India, Aug. 23.—Reports from Karachi today said the flooding river Indus, swollen by 36 hours of rain since a dam broke on the upper part of its course, was submerging many villages along its banks and carried the bodies of many villagers and cattle and even wild animals.

The population of Kotri has been evacuated. All the townspeople around Manjiband were camped around the railway station awaiting trains to carry them from the danger zone.

The military commissioner of the Sind division, which the floods are expected to reach tomorrow, has asked for military aid to meet the emergency.

PAYS SPEEDER'S FINE JUST TO GET TICKET

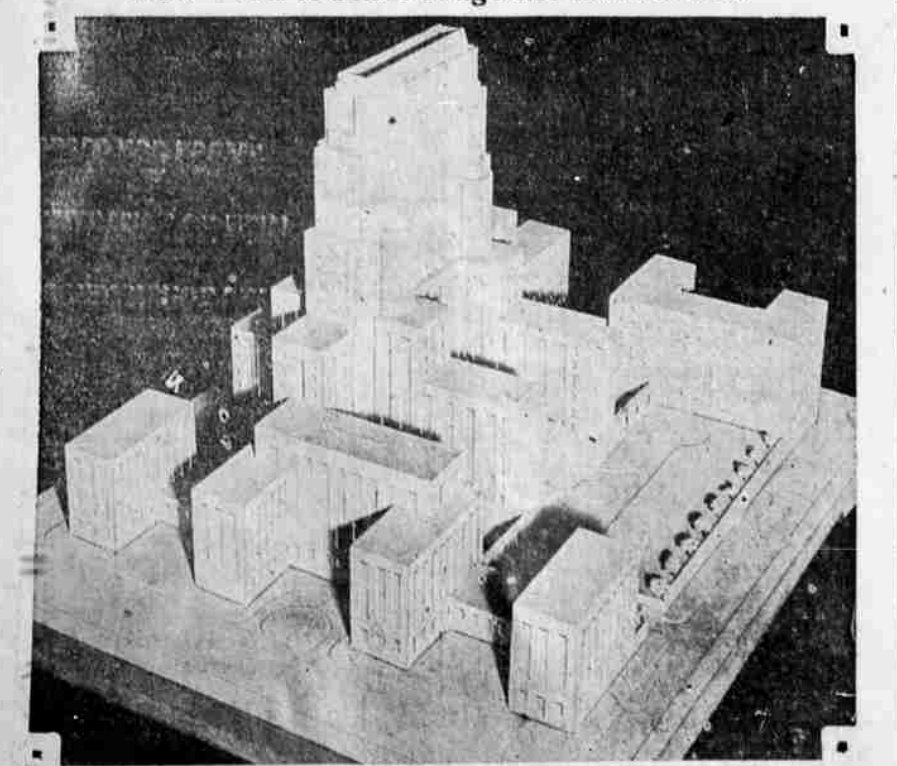

She paid \$25 in traffic court for one when a friend, Carl Ditch of Switzerland, was hailed for speeding in her car.

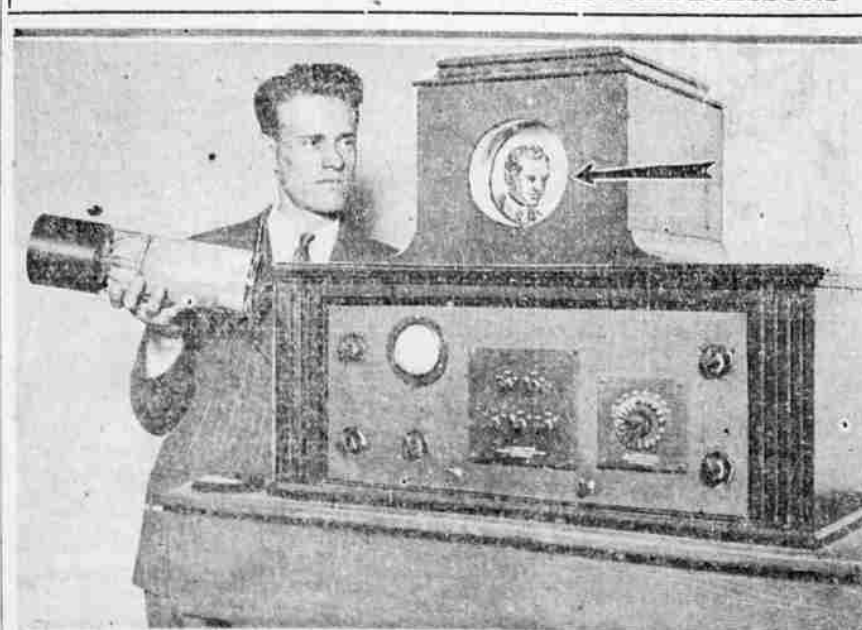
She asked to retain the ticket, explaining she already had them from Spain, Switzerland, France, Germany, Austria and Italy.
