FOREST SERVICE SECURES DATA ON HANDLING GOATS

Ideal range for Angora goats should possess suitable forage at all times of the year, be well drained and free from continuing heavy rains, and be adequately supplied with watering places and suitable bed grounds, according to a new bulletin just issued by the U. S. forest service.

As browse furnishes much of the forage for goats on the ranges, and in the winter is the principal goat feed, an abundance of good browse should be available. Some important browse plants of high palatability are mountain mahogany, the blue brush of the Pacific coast, fenderia, bitter brush, and service berry. The oaks are less palatable but important browse in the West. It is also essential to have succulent grass and weeds for the summer.

Good range management includes conservative stocking, dividing the range so as to afford the best feed during each season, and obtaining as nearly even utilization of all parts of the range as possible. The grazing capacity of a range area is the number of animals which may be carried on it year after year without injury to the forage and with sufficient palatable feed. An average of approximately 4 acres of the grass brush type and from 3 to 6 acres of the true brush type can be allotted to each goat for yearling grazing.

Reduction in the quantity of available forage, increase in non-palatable plants, stubble appearance in the browse species, and thin goats are signs of overgrazing. Overgrazed areas should have the number of animals reduced so the palatable forage plants will not be injured; and if possible, such areas should be protected from grazing until after the main forage plants have matured seed. Open, quiet herding and the bedding of the goats on a new ground every night are recommended.

TOURIST TRAVEL ON INCREASE, SAYS CAMP PROPRIETOR

"The folks who say that tourist travel over the Pacific highway has fallen off this year are wrong," said Mrs. Peterson, proprietor of the Canyon camp, located on the Pacific highway a short distance south of Canyonville, when she was recently asked if the completion of the coast highway had injured her business to any extent. Not only is traffic much heavier, but it is of a much higher class. Cars are better and tourists, instead of packing for gas and supplies with alcohol, shoes and quarters, now order large bills and travelers' checks.

Mrs. Peterson established the Canyon camp nearly eight years ago. Two years ago Mrs. Peterson passed away and Mrs. Peterson continued as proprietor of the business. In the past eight years Mrs. Peterson has served many changes in tourist travel but no difference has been noticeable as the contrast between the travelers on the road this year and those of last year. "We have little or no repair business in our garage now although a year ago this time we were working almost night and day fixing up old cars." She went on, "The biggest tourist year was 1925. It is possible if weather conditions permit, that 1929 will exceed the peak year. The late spring this year, though, may make the total volume less than that of 1925."

Canyon camp, incidentally, is no ordinary "canyon camp." Mrs. Peterson owns 83 acres. There is a restaurant, operated now by Mr. and Mrs. George Williams. There is a fine concrete swimming pool, through which the water from Canyon creek runs all day long. There are 16 cottages of the ordinary type and three deluxe or "hotel" cottages. There has not been one night all summer that Mrs. Peterson has not been compelled to turn away guests because her cottages were all filled. Every possible accommodation is offered the tourist and accommodation for all classes is provided. Commenting on this phase Mrs. Peterson said that quite a number of the tourist parties that stay at Canyon camp are traveling with a chauffeur. Tourists from every state in the Union have been Mrs. Peterson's guests as well as folks from many foreign countries. Thus far this year Mrs. Peterson says that besides sheltering cars from most of the ordinary and well known countries of Europe, cars have stopped at Canyon camp from Persia, Peru, the Congo and Venezuela.

FIGURES INDICATE HUNTERS ARE INCREASING IN NUMBERS

During the season 1927-28 more than 6,450,000 hunting licenses for the taking of wild game were issued to sportsmen throughout the United States, including Alaska, and the income to the states amounted to more than \$9,000,000. New York state, with 675,750 licenses and \$899,873 in money received, and Pennsylvania, with 517,729 licenses and a revenue of \$1,006,159, headed the list. Detailed figures for the season compiled by the bureau of Biological Survey of the United States department of agriculture show substantial increases in numbers of licenses issued and fees received over the preceding three years. In the 1924-25 season, 4,904,740 hunting licenses for their licensees a total of \$6,120,963, while in 1925-26

hunting licenses to the number of 6,168,363 were issued, bringing a revenue of \$6,872,812 to the states. Licenses issued in 1926-27 numbered 5,987,505, and the fees paid were \$8,155,535.
