

CAPTAIN WINCH STRONG BOOSTER FOR THE UMPQUA

California Radio Stations
Ask Him Not to Talk
About Streams in
Other States.

Captain Frank Winch, editor of Field and Stream magazine, who in a few hours was converted into one of the strongest boosters and best friends the North Umpqua river has ever had, is doing a great deal of publicity work for the local stream on his trip in the Southwest. He writes that he has shown the North Umpqua films before hundreds of men at various meetings of sportsmen's clubs, service clubs, chambers of commerce, etc., and has answered thousands of inquiries regarding the river.

He ran against a snag, however, in his radio broadcasts. After a few mentions of the Umpqua river he was asked by the operators of California stations to refrain from talking about fishing streams outside of that state, but despite that fact has succeeded in frequently getting in a boat for the Umpqua.

Captain Winch is mentioned in the Oakland (California), Kiwanis bulletin as follows:

"Captain Winch is internationally known as a big game hunter, dry fly angler, champion rifle and pistol shot. Winner of the international dry fly casting championship at Glasgow, Scotland, 1915, and of the championship Veterans of Foreign Wars, Washington, 1926. A grandson of the famous pioneer, John P. Walker, Captain Winch was for years associated with the late William F. Cody, 'Buffalo Bill.' He is a native of California and was for many years crime reporter on one of California's leading metropolitan dailies, and is at present a member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. We are fortunate, by correspondence with his New York office, to secure Captain Winch to speak to us on this date as he will only spend one day in the bay region on his present 12,000-mile automobile tour of the United States for the purpose of studying at first hand the conditions which effect the nation's wild life."

His itinerary for August and the first part of September will take him into some of the larger cities of the southern part of the country, and he is carrying the message of the Umpqua to all of these places. Talks will be as follows:

"all Palestine to break down Balfour Imperialism." The Moslem committee for defense of the walling wall issued an appeal to the Moslems, alleging responsibility cast upon the Jews. The appeal asserted the Jews sought to extend their rights at the wall and contended: "This is dangerous and inadmissible."

The Zionist executive and the national council of Palestine Jews issued a "call to national discipline," deploring events and criticizing the action of police as having proceeded "without pity." The statement said that at the funeral of Abraham Mizrahi, occasion for a violent outbreak, scores of persons were injured, including aged persons and others who had submitted to the order of the police.

It was said the organizations would meet the government representatives and demand that those guilty of the action be punished.

Americans Ask Warship
JERUSALEM, Aug. 21.—A delegation of Americans now in Jerusalem tonight asked the United States consul to request the sending of an American warship to Palestine when rioting between Arabs and Jews over the right of worship at the walling wall brought nine more deaths in and around the holy city this afternoon.

Savant Challenges Belief That Death Is Inevitable; Urges Study "Prevent Phenomena" to Demise

BOSTON, Aug. 23.—A challenge to the belief that death is inevitable was laid before the scientists of the International Physiological congress today by Eusebio A. Hernandez of the College of France, Paris.

He appealed for formation of a worldwide scientific organization to study means to "prevent the phenomena of death."

Proof already exists, he said, that death is not altogether so inescapable as fatalists have taught. Physiologists possess evidence to the contrary obtained by keeping single organs alive after death of the other parts of the body.

Previous Tests Cited

The first of these demonstrations, said Dr. Hernandez, was made by Prof. J. P. Heymans in 1912, when he preserved life in an isolated head for two or three hours. Recently there have been reports of similar experiments in Russia. A human heart has been kept alive for 30 hours after death by Prof. A. Kouhlabko, Russian physiologist. Hernandez said that others have succeeded to a certain extent in re-establishing the general circulation, and that he and Prof. Pareille of Milan have obtained results "not altogether negative" in restoring respiration of a dog.

Seventeen years have passed, he added, since Heymans told the scientific world how to keep the head alive, but no further progress has been made. The fault for this delay, he argued, lies not in lack of ability but in research workers, but in their impatience.

14-INCH RAILWAY GUN RECEIVED ON PACIFIC COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—After being stared at by thousands of amazed citizens during its transcontinental journey from Aberdeen proving ground, Maryland, a monster 14-inch railway coast gun arrived at the United States Army arsenal on the Pacific coast recently.

This Leviathan, one of the largest and most powerful pieces of artillery in the nation, will shoot a 1,400-pound projectile 25 miles. The exploding force of the projectile is so great, army officers say, that one shot would destroy an entire village 25 miles away.

For instance, a 25-mile radius around Portland, Seattle, Los Angeles, Denver or Butte could be laid bare by the big guns now with the installation of this most recent 14-inch coast weapon.

The gun is said to be strategically mobile, but not tactically mobile; that is it cannot be moved about at short notice on a battlefield, but it can be moved anywhere along a railway and when time permits a special track can be laid to take the gun to any desired point.

Here are some facts about this giant rifle:

It cost \$185,000 of which \$60,000 was for the gun and \$125,000 for the mount.

Its weight with carriage is 730,000 pounds, far greater than any locomotive.

Length, 25 feet, 4 inches; height of mount, 14 feet, 1 inch; breadth, 10 feet.

A crew of 50 men is necessary to man the monster with a total of 200 men necessary to fill every place in range and gun sections.

It can be put in firing position in less than 2 hours under field conditions. If in permanent emplacement and if the fire control equipment is in place it can begin firing within a half hour.

The tremendous recoil is such that a tronton pull of 1,180,000 pounds is developed.

MEN VISITORS AT LANE CLUB AFFAIR

A delegation of local business men, representing two of the service clubs, went to Eugene yesterday and attended the club fair, which is a feature of the annual Lane county fair. W. M. Campbell, W. R. Strawn and J. C. Leedy, represented the Kiwanis club, and Homer Cross the Lions club. They were accompanied by J. Roland Parker, Douglas county club leader.

The delegation first visited the egg packing plant maintained by the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers, through which the eggs from the Umpqua valley are passing.

The visit to the fair was made at the invitation of Arnold D. Collier, 4-H club leader for Lane county, and from members of the club. The boys and girls are very proud of their new exhibit building, livestock barns and other equipment that has been provided for their use. The buildings for the club department were constructed at a cost of \$12,000 of which the boys and girls raised \$5,500, the rest being contributed by business men and organizations.

Lane county has over 2,600 club members, this being the largest enrollment of any county in the United States. 850 members were exhibitors and the new buildings were not large enough to accommodate the displays, the livestock barn, particularly, being too small. Judges of rabbits and poultry classes, declared that the club members had better quality than was shown in the open classes of the main fair.

At noon the Douglas county delegation was entertained at a delicious luncheon served by the girls of the cooking clubs.

Funeral services for Mrs. W. J. Luncford of Marcola will be held here on Monday at 2 p. m. Mrs. Luncford formerly resided in Roseburg and died Friday at the Eugene hospital. The services will be in charge of the Douglas Funeral home and held at the family plot at the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Mrs. Luncford was a sister of R. C. Robertson of this city.

PEACE PACT TO BE STUDIED BY HIGH SCHOOLS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Aug. 24.—(Special).—An intensive educational campaign to acquaint students of the United States with the far-reaching importance of the Paris Pact will extend to high schools throughout Oregon, it is announced here by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon, who has been named a member of a committee in charge by Arthur Charles Watkins, director of the National Student forum.

The principal and other faculty members of the Roseburg high school will be asked to cooperate in the national project, and will be supplied with all information and literature necessary upon application to the director whose address is 532 Seventeenth street, Washington, D. C. Dr. Hall states:

While the national student project is essentially for study and discussion, optional competitive features which include as a prize a trip to Europe next summer will be open to high schools taking part. It is stated, the project, which has for its aim the gaining of a better understanding of the important Paris Pact for the renunciation of war, has been enthusiastically endorsed by all leading educators, and prospects are that the study movement will be very successful, it is pointed out by Dr. Hall.

The awards competition will be based on a theme contest of 300 words on "How May the Pact for the Renunciation of War be made most effective?" and besides the trip to Europe, many state and local prizes will be offered.

To the first 800 high schools applying, a copy of Professor Shotwell's booklet, "The Renunciation of War" will be sent free of charge, in addition to other material made available by various peace promotion agencies.

High schools throughout Oregon are expected to take part in the national project, Dr. Hall states. "The Paris Pact stands as one of the most important documents ever drawn, and it is our hope that this national program may place the facts before the public, so that an intelligent public opinion on the realities involved may be developed. We do not care what side or attitude is taken on the pact, so long as the merits of the treaty are discussed openly and honestly."
