FIRST CLEAN-UP WILL BE MADE AT DAFFODIL MINES

A group of the officers and stockholders of the Daffodil Mining company left this morning for Dunsmuir, California, near which place their property is situated and will be present when the first clean-up is made. This company recently purchased the famous Daffodil property and for the past year has engaged in development work. Owing to the peculiar formation, several companies in the past were unable to successfully operate the placer claim, due to the fact that slides came in on top of their sluice boxes.

The new company overcame this difficulty by running a tunnel through rock and placing their sluice boxes in the tunnel. The surface dirt has been washed away and the water will soon start uncovering the bedrock. The surface dirt has been run through the sluice boxes, which have not been cleaned since operations started.

Arrangements have been made to clean out the boxes before the operations start in the real pay dirt and the local men will be present for this first clean-up. While it is not expected that the sluices will yield any large amount of gold, yet it is expected that there will be a good showing, considering that only the surface dirt has been washed.
