SOME TOURIST TRAVEL FACTS

TOURIST registrations cleared through the secretary of state's office for the first seven months of this year show an increase of 5,423 over the first seven months of last year. Travel began late this year because of the late spring so the gain, if we have a late fall, will be much larger proportionally for the year. For instance, weather conditions in July this year were about the same as July last year. July is also the banner tourist month. Of the 5,423 total increase for the year, 4,507 was gained in July. Where do all the tourists who visit Oregon come from? The secretary of state's figures show that of the total of 58,750 registrations thus far this year 36,591 were from California and 9,971 from Washington. This leaves a total of 12,188 representing 44 other states in the Union. All but two states have been represented with motor car registrations in Oregon thus far this year.

The great increase in the business of building and loan companies all over the United States is one of the hopeful signs of modern business. In the first place the fact that people have money and save it by depositing it with the building and loan companies indicates a general personal prosperity. In the second place, money thus saved, is not, as some people might assume, taken out of circulation. Quite the reverse is true. The money deposited with building and loan companies is loaned out to be used for building new homes or modernizing old ones. Most of this money is used right in the community from which it is received. The effect then, is that money might otherwise lie dormant or be sent out of the community, is put to most active use buying materials and furnishing employment to workmen.

"Usually I put her on a compass course and then go back to the cabin in perfect confidence. I know many good pilots are quite capable of steering a good course by the compass, but the Duchess has so far made not a single mistake and, instead of being a passenger she has been a tremendous help to us on the flight."

RIGHT LIVING BRINGS POISE AND CONTROL

Properly Nourished Body, However, a Prerequisite to a Normal Nervous System—Air, Sleep and Exercise Are Vitally Important Factors.

HOW much thought do you give to the protection of your nervous system? Do you lead such a life as to build up and strengthen your brain and nerves? Or, on the contrary, are you gradually destroying your nervous system?

It is not difficult to determine something of the nervous make-up of the driver of an automobile. Much can be learned by observation, even of an experienced driver. Speed mania, for example, is frequently a symptom of an irritable and overworked nervous system.

One of the most important things in the world is the development of poise. The lack of it is a good deal like the absence of a balance wheel in a watch. Without poise and mental balance the individual runs wild. It takes a lot more poise to be a conservative than it does to be a radical of the radicals.

I wish there were some effective way to drill into the human family the importance of patience. Impatience and the mood that goes with it are responsible for most of the unhappiness and many of the accidents today.

It pays to take care of the nervous system. You are using it if you do not get sufficient fresh air, sleep, sunshine and a reasonable amount of exercise. These are essential to your nervous well-being.

The nervous system is not well cared for unless the body is properly nourished. This part of the body is so complex in its nature that it will suffer greatly if it is not supplied with an abundance of pure rich food.

Almost every day, somebody asks me, "What is a good tonic for the blood?" The answer is: "Good blood is not supplied by the drug store. It does not come in bottles, boxes or powder papers. Good blood depends upon an abundance of good food. It depends upon exercise and the observance of the rules of hygiene."

If you would have a normal nervous system, perfect control of the emotions and that precious possession known as poise, you must have good food and practice the rules of right living.

Answers to Health Queries
E. N. Q.—What can be done for indigestion and gases the trouble occurs only after eating and often causes severe pain?
A.—Correct the diet, avoiding too many rich, sweet foods and keep the system clear. The food does not digest, fermenting and causing acidity in the system.

T. Y. Q.—Would the sniffing of salt water for the purpose of cleaning the nostrils prove injurious to the hearing or in any other way?
A.—It is necessary to see a physician in order to locate the cause of unpleasant breath and to determine the necessary treatment.

Good Manners

DEAR MRS. BEECKMAN:
1. Is it correct for a guest, at a home wedding, to wear a sleeveless dress if she wears white gloves with ruffs (short gloves)?
2. Is it correct to have your only sister as matron of honor, and no bridesmaids, or is it necessary that one have at least one bridesmaid? Some of my friends say that at least one bridesmaid is necessary when having a matron of honor. The groom is having his brother as best man.

3. What is the correct dress for the groom to wear at an afternoon wedding—two-thirds? When the bride wears a veil? Also when the bride wears an afternoon dress?
4. One of my friends is giving a shower for me. The difficulty is that this shower is to be given at least ten days before I leave the office for good, and at least ten days before the announcement will appear in the paper. These people are leaving on their holidays, and will not be back until just two

days before the wedding. What is the proper thing to do in this case—announce the wedding just after the shower, or wait until I leave the office before the announcement is made?
5. Is it necessary to have a trousseau too? I really will not have the time, but live in a large house where this will all be done for me, and could easily do so for some of my girl friends, but I do not like the idea. HEADER

1. SINCE the sleeveless dress is in fashion this year, this would be correct—but the guest should be sure that a sleeveless afternoon dress is becoming to her. It would be better, even so, if the woman must wear a jacket with her dress, making an ensemble.

2. No, it is not necessary to have a bridesmaid. It is quite correct to have only a matron of honor. Indeed, it is better to have only one chaperon, than it is to have one and one bridesmaid, for in the latter case the bridesmaid has to walk alone in both the processional and recessional.

3. When the bride wears the traditional white bridal dress and veil, the groom, too, must wear formal clothes, which are, for a day wedding, the cutaway coat and dark striped trousers.

When the bride wears an afternoon dress, the groom may appropriately wear the cutaway coat and dark striped trousers, or, if he prefers, the dark blue business suit.

4. I should think that, under these circumstances, it would be more consistent to make the announcement of your engagement or the announcement of when your wedding is to take place, when shower takes place. Waiting until you leave the office would seem to postpone this announcement too long.

5. If you do not like the idea of a trousseau, there is no reason for your having one. They are not necessary occasions, and I can well understand how you feel about it.
