Our American Birds Popular Home Lessons in Natural History

THE BIRD OF THE WEEK (By Louis Albert Banks) (Cut out this book each week and you will soon have an interesting bird book of your own.)

THE LOON The loon is a fine big bird three feet long who does not care at all for our acquaintance. He breeds from our northern states bordering on Canada to the Arctic Circle, then scatters down over all North America, wintering in our own southern states. He is a queer bird, haunting our ponds and lakes; and usually only one pair of loons to the lake. He is very good looking; upper parts glossy black, showing iridescent violet and green tints; back and wings spotted and barred with white; white spaces lined with black on the neck, marking off black bands like collars; sides of breast streaked with black and white; breast and underneath white; bill stout, straight, sharply pointed and yellowish green; feet black and webbed. Sometimes they, locally, call him hell-diver. It can surpass any duck in diving and swims rapidly under water. The cry of the loon is usually followed by a strange outburst of maniacal laughter, weirdly realistic, and can often be heard a long distance. Hence the expression "crazy as a loon." They make a flimsy nest close to the water where they can readily dive out of sight. They have two eggs of a yellowish brown color with black spots. The loon is so quick that it is almost impossible to kill one with a gun.
