

FARM BOARD HEAD MEETS SOCIAL QUIZ IN HUMOROUS WAY

"Correct" Washington Told
He Is Ex-Bandit, Capone
Aide and Would Eat
in Kitchen.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Alexander
Legge was loth today to become
excited over his status in Wash-
ington society.

The chairman of President Hoover's new farm board displayed interest over reports that Washington hostesses were at a loss how to classify him socially. As Mr. Legge saw it, the question was whether he rated near the head of the table or the foot. To solve the problem, if there is a problem, he suggested that he eat in the kitchen.

"And if that interferes with the cooking, I'll be glad to wait for the second table," he added.

"Get this right," said the man who resigned a \$100,000 a year job with the International Harvester company to help the administration with the farm question, "when it comes to society, I'm a dud."

He explained that his social status became a matter of concern shortly after he went to Washington. Hostesses and their secretaries began telephoning, inquiring of his stenographer into the Legge family history and his Chicago social connections.

Prober Gets Earful
"I told my stenographer that I'd handle all future inquiries of that nature myself," Legge said. "Soon I got a call from one of them. I said to him:

"My first claim to any prominence was robbing Wells-Fargo stage coaches. When that went out I took up train robbery, rustling horses between, as a member of Doc Middleton's gang of 'honorable' thieves.

"Since I've been in Chicago, I signed with Al Capone, and you can just put me down wherever this rates me." The fellow hung up before I finished.

Kitchen Preferred
"We farmers are busy and we don't banker after any social functioning. We don't want to go to any select dinners; but if we have to, and have to put on fried shirts and such things, then all I want to say is this:

"We respectfully ask that we be given places in the kitchen with the rest of the help, and if that interferes with the culinary business, we want to wait for the second table. We don't belong in any high crowds, and we want to be just farmers. It doesn't seem to us that social functions can ever help the farmer in any way, so I guess they'd better just count us out."
