although in the Pacific skirted the edge of a typhoon, the roughest going of the whole journey was crossing the American Rockies.

It was announced that Dr. Eckener would take off in a plane at noon to pay his respects to the President in Washington.

Air Chief Has Mishap—BRIDGEPORT, N. J., Aug. 29.—William P. McCracken, Jr., assistant secretary of commerce in charge of aeronautics, was slightly hurt late last night when an airplane in which he was flying from Cleveland to Lakehurst, was wrecked in a forced landing near here.

The plane with C. H. Charles at the controls, struck telegraph wires, overturned twice and landed upside down. Mr. McCracken suffered only a cut knee and the pilot, escaped with a sprained wrist.

The assistant secretary, who had attended the national derby air races in the Ohio city, was flying in a government-owned cabin plane to deliver an important message to Dr. Eckener. He resumed his journey to Lakehurst by automobile he said.

The accident had been caused when fuel ran short and a forced landing became necessary.

Third Day Aloft—SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 29.—The Empire State Standard, piloted by Claude R. Vanborn and Carl A. Dixon in an effort to set a new refueling endurance record, neared its third full day in the air today since it took off from the New York state fair grounds here Monday.

Eaker Forced Down—CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 29.—The transcontinental mail plane Shuttle was forced down when struck by a 5-gallon can of oil during a refueling contact here late last night while on a return flight from New York in an attempt to establish a record for sustained and linear-distance flying.

Captain Iva K. Eaker, pilot, immediately made an effort to secure permission to reattempt the flight, he said today, and expected to take off late today or tomorrow if the second flight is approved.

The plane was undamaged in landing, and neither Eaker nor his copilot, Lieut. Bernard Thompson, was injured.

The Shuttle, carrying mail from Oakland, Calif., to New York, was making the fifth contact on the flight when the accident occurred.

The flight, in which the United States post office department and army officials cooperated, was made to determine the feasibility of long distance flights with mail by the Boeing Aircraft company.

Chicago Plane Still Up—CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—The "Chicago-We Will" endurance record makers dived along through the muck of early days with 139 hours of continuous flying to their credit. That was at 8:31 o'clock this morning. The fliers dropped a note last night congratulating the Graf Zeppelin for its record flight and adding, "But we expect to make one ourselves pretty soon."
