BRITISH TROOPS RESTORE ORDER IN PALESTINE

Efficiently successful to admit a survey of the situation and to begin the gruesome task of collecting the dead. In one house alone nineteen bodies were found. In some cases bodies were hanging from windows; in others they had been mercilessly thrown into the streets.

In practically every instance death was caused by swords or knives. Even young children of two or three years, many of them girls, did not escape the savagery of the attack.

While the death toll in Hebron is estimated at nearly sixty, only ten Moslems were killed by the Jewish defense. The American Jewish casualties in the town were in the rabbinical college where the youths were pursuing their religious studies. Twenty-nine American students survived the attack.

Valuable work in removing wounded Jews from Hebron to Jerusalem was done by the Zionist executive committee in Jerusalem which dispatched motor buses escorted by armored cars for this purpose.

Some Arabs Aid Jews
The Arab attitude toward the Jews in Hebron is by no means unanimously hostile, travelers report. There were cases at Hebron and elsewhere, they say, where Arab neighbors saved Jews from the fury of the mobs. Seven Jews thus were protected in a village between Hebron and Jerusalem and subsequently they were evacuated to Jerusalem. In another case two fellow workers saved a Jewish driver of a steam roller.

Jews Would Raise Army
NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The American Palestine Jewish legion in a telegram yesterday to Sir Esmé Howard, British ambassador to the United States at Washington, offered the services of 10,000 fighting men to aid in the restoration of peace in Palestine.

Most of the 10,000 American Jews are war veterans; the telegram stated, and a great number of them fought with Lord Allenby in Palestine in the World war.

"Despite the gratitude of world Jewry to the British troops in Palestine, we voice the prevalent Jewish sentiment in exile that protection of the Jews in Palestine shall be shared by them with the British," the message said.

One battalion of legion members can be entrained at once for Can-

ada to be shipped overseas, the message said.

Heroism Saves Scrolls.
JERUSALEM, Aug. 29.—Out of the chaos of the Palestine disorders there was revealed today heroism which stood out like a tale from the old testament.

After the massacre, last Sabbath, in which 15 Americans were among 70 Jews killed, a few survivors decided to try to rescue the sacred scrolls of the Torah, containing five books of Moses written in ancient Hebrew, from the Hebron synagogue.

They obtained the scrolls and started for Jerusalem. They almost reached the city when a band of Arabs attacked them and in their attempt to keep the holy scrolls of Hebrew law from profanation, 13 more Hebron Jews were injured.

Two young Jews who were understood to be theolodical students at Hebron Talmudic college protected the scrolls with their bodies, receiving severe wounds. Their fight was successful and the holy archives brought to safety.

Paris Jews Protest
PARIS, Aug. 29.—Police scattered between 3,000 and 4,000 Jews who met last night in front of a synagogue on the Rue Pavée to protest happenings in Palestine.

No interference was made with harangues mounted tables and invited the manifestants to march to the British embassy.
