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NORMAN ROSS IN LEAD OF SWIMMERS IN ONTARIO RACE

(Associated Press Special Wire) TORONTO, Aug. 30.—A 100-foot race for more than seven and one-half miles, Clarence Ross of Brooklyn, N. Y., surrounded first place in the Wrigley Canadian national exhibition 15-mile swimming race today in his namesake, Norman Ross, of Chicago, on the fifth lap.

(Associated Press Special Wire) TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 30.—The big field of contestants in the Wrigley-Canadian national exhibition fifteen mile swim in Lake Ontario, were off on the long grind for \$25,000 prize money at 11:08 a. m. today.

While a crowd of 25,000 persons viewed the spectacle, the entrants numbering more than 200 stroled to the pontoons garbed in bath suits and grease of various colors, lined up and took the plunge together at the roar of a brass cannon.

Ruth C. Tower, of Toronto, and Mrs. Prael Armstrong, of Detroit, the only women competitors, had their bodies smeared with heavy black grease which also coated their black bathing suits.

More than 400 sent in their entries for the marathon, but only 276 showed up for physical examination. Of these, only one, John Greer, 52 years old, was turned down.

Popular opinion has installed Ernest Vierkoetter of Germany, winner of the 1927 event, as the outstanding favorite.

Second choice is George Young who won the Catalina Island swim three years ago.

Clarence Ross of Brooklyn, N. Y., appeared to be leading by about 25 yards when the first half-mile had been covered.
