

PITTSBURGH DOWNS CUBS 3 STRAIGHT UNDER NEW PILOT

Athletics Gain Half Game
by Donated Victory as
Yanks Drop Half of
Doubleheader.

The march of Pittsburgh's phantom legion moves on through the darkness in a stubborn attempt to recapture a vanished hope. It all seems so impossible, but this return of Cornish ghosts from the grave nevertheless is giving the national league and all baseball for that matter, the only shred of a promise moment the stretch run of 1929 can know.

The miracle may last no longer, but remarkably enough, it has carried through three games in two days, to the utter amazement of Joseph McCarthy and the Cubs. The third Pittsburgh decision was gained by 5 to 4 at Forbes field yesterday as a small bundle of the faithful sat and watched.

This latest Pirate victory served only to reduce the leads of the Cubs to eleven and one-half games. The Brooklyn Dodgers need all the series, and all may be too little, but they at least hope that Brame and possibly Grimes can continue the spirit against Bush and Blake. Then, with the brain lead short to nine and one-half games, Mr. Jewel Eas might be permitted to wonder just how great a miracle was needed to accomplish what would be the greatest of all baseball miracles.

Giants Down Robins.

Bill Walker, the young Giant southpaw, flared with the hall of fame at Ebbets field yesterday when he held the Robins hitless through eight rounds only to see them pick up four blows and two runs in the ninth. The Giants won the game 6 to 2. Mel Ott helped with his 33rd homer.

The Phillies scored twice in the tenth at Boston to nose out the Braves, 5 to 4.

The Athletics added half a game to their lead by shattering the Red Sox 7 to 6, as the Yankees divided two with the Senators. Babe Ruth's thirty seventh home run enabled the Yanks to save the opener 5 to 4, after a circuit drive by Goose Goslin apparently had sewed up the decision for Fred Marberry and the Senators. Washington routed Hoyt in the nightcap to win by 3 to 4.

Big Ed Morris delivered a better fate in his game against the Macks, but that Red Sox preface at an infield fell to pieces in the seventh and three unearned runs dashed home before the tide could be stemmed. Jack Rothrock, smashed a homer in the fourth with the bases filled.

Ted Lyons continued his rampage by shattering the ambitious Indians in Chicago 2 to 1. Willis Hudlin made the White Sox work for everything they got but they finally broke down his armor in the ninth.

The Browns seized the Cleveland defeat as an opportunity to entrench the St. Louis standard more firmly in third place. Sammy Gray gave eight scattered hits as the Browns defeated Earl Whitehill and the Tigers 6 to 1.

DUCKS DROP INTO TIE WITH ANGELS FOR LEADERSHIP

The pugacious Portland Ducks and the equally hard fighting Angels from Los Angeles were tugging neck and neck in a tie for the Pacific coast league leadership today, the official scoring crediting each club with 35 won and 24 lost for the second half of the 1929 season.

Up in Portland, where the fur has been flying thick and fast in baseball circles lately, the Ducks were sunk again yesterday by the northwestern under a 3 to 0 score. And that loss wiped out the lead the Ducks gained by defeating the San Francisco Seals seven in a row last week. Ed Beach and his fast pill held the Portland crew to but three hits, one of them a ninth pop fly scratch.

Hollywood made it four straight over Sacramento by taking both ends of a doubleheader at Wrigley field, Los Angeles. The score of the first battle was 7 to 5 and the nightcap ended 1 to 0.

The San Francisco Missions awaited out an 11 to 0 victory over Oakland, and the series today stood two to one in favor of the home team, the Missions.

COUNTY DECLINES DEBT TO AID ROOSEVELT HIGHWAY

(Continued from page 1)

The county judge stated, "but due to our limited road income we cannot undertake such an enormous project without plunging the county into heavy indebtedness, which we do not propose to do until we can see some means whereby we can pay."

Cooperation Cited

The county purchased the right of way and cooperated in the construction of the Roosevelt highway from the Coos county line to Reedport. Not having the money to pay for that cooperation, the county accepted advances from the state and made payment as rapidly as the funds could be secured, but is still owing the state money for that work and is now being pressed by the commission for payment. As a further evidence of cooperation, however, the county is now securing right of way for the Roosevelt highway north from Reedport to the Lane county line.

During the last three years the major portion of the highway money raised in Douglas county has been spent on the Roosevelt highway and the connecting link from Reedport to Drain. Cooperation with the state and federal government to the fullest extent of its ability.

Douglas county is one of the largest of western Oregon. It is the hardest county in the state in which to build roads, because of its rough topography. Its road income is lower than that of almost any other county west of the Cascades. The court does not feel that it can sacrifice its important lateral roads leading to the main highway, roads that are so badly needed by resident citizens. These roads cannot be improved if all money were diverted to the Roosevelt highway, which would be necessary if the coast section should be undertaken.

"In the judgment of the court it is more important to complete the Reedport-Drain road, linking the Roosevelt highway and the Pacific Highway, by reason of the fact that it is a connecting highway and one having heavy market value."

The Douglas county court is carrying out its road program with a view of affording the largest immediate benefit to Douglas county residents as a whole, and in carrying out that idea is allocating to the Roosevelt highway as much money as the limited income will permit.
