PIGEON POINT, CALIFORNIA, HORROR SCENE

persons had perished early this morning with the sinking of the coastwise passenger vessel San Juan 30 miles south of here were given in radio messages from two rescue vessels four hours after the fact. The two vessels at that time had reported rescuing 33 persons.

The San Juan went down in about five minutes after colliding with the Standard Oil tanker S. C. T. Dodd at midnight off Pigeon Point, Cal. Although one side of the Dodd was stove in, she lowered boats and went to the rescue of the 160 persons who were pitched into the sea as the San Juan sank.

Another ship, the Munam, turned from her course nearby and aided in the rescue work. By 4 a. m. the Dodd was on its way to San Francisco with 27 survivors, some of them badly injured and in need of medical attention; the Munam had taken eight others aboard and was standing by, looking for those who may have remained afloat after the sinking.

74 Unaccounted For
Radio accounts of the rescue indicated, however, that the chances for many of the 74 unaccounted for persons were slim, due to the speed with which the San Juan sank and the fact that darkness and confusion handicapped the rescue workers.

There were about 100 persons aboard the San Juan when she left San Francisco last night for Los Angeles. The San Juan, a vessel built in 1922, of 3500 tons, was operated by the Los Angeles and San Francisco Navigation company and featured low rates for travel between the two California cities.

She carried a crew of 45 and about 50 passengers, most of the latter being from Los Angeles.

Survivors aboard the Dodd said they saw Adolf F. Asplund go down with his ship.

Fog Hampers Rescue
A heavy fog had hung over the Pigeon Point area since yesterday afternoon.

Cries of passengers pierced the darkness as the ship sank. Radio messages describing the sinking said passengers and crew were hurled into a wreckage-strewn vortex. Lights from the Dodd and the Munam swept the surface of the water, adding crews in small boats. Thick fog hampered their efforts, however.

The Dodd at first was reported to have been in a sinking condition but later wireless reports said she was not damaged enough to be in danger and that members of her crew had taken to life boats to do rescue work instead of to abandon the oil tanker, as was originally thought. The Dodd is a vessel of about 7000 tons.

Captain Vacation Worker
Captain Asplund, who was reported in radio messages to have gone down with the San Juan, was acting master of the stricken ship during a leave of absence granted to his regular master, Captain

George Winkel. It was learned from the marine department of the chamber of commerce.

Ralph Hillman, second radio operator of the San Juan, who was picked up by the Dodd, reported that the collision occurred while he was asleep. He sprang from his berth and ran to the main deck. The dock was sinking beneath the surface and he was hurled into the sea.

Hillman said no lifeboats had been launched from the San Juan. Two coast guard cutters, the Shawnee and the Taboe, went to the scene of the wreck from San Francisco, while preparations got under way here to receive the injured from the tanker. Ambulances were sent to the pier at which the Dodd was expected to dock at 9:30 a. m.

Munam Saves Ten
ABOARD MUNAM, off Pigeon Point, Calif., Aug. 30.—Ten survivors of the passenger steamer San Juan were aboard this rescue ship today following a night of desperate effort to save the lives of those who were cast into the ocean after its collision with the S. C. T. Dodd shortly before midnight.

"The distress signal following the collision between the vessels was heard by our radio operator at 11:55 p. m.," said the captain, Gus Illig.

"We were just three miles astern of the San Juan in response to the signals we proceeded with all possible speed to the scene of the collision."

"As the Munam pierced through the fog to the scene we found the San Juan sinking. We drifted in wreckage of the steamer for two hours. The wreckage was so thick it was difficult to pull a life boat through it."

"Oil from the lost ship, which coated the water, also added to rescue difficulties."

"Life boats of the Munam were in the water at 12:30 a. m. and dived about as best they could in response to cries of passengers and crew struggling in the water and wreckage."

The complete list of the survivors of the wreckage rescued by the Munam is: Mr. and Mrs. Feltows, Los Angeles; Rosa Perez Rulfo, San Francisco; Harry Wade, Lee Leaters, Alex Cowie, W. H. Jano, V. Garcia, James Gallagher, J. K. Hamilton.

Deck House Afloat
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—The Mackay Radio and Telegraph company today received a wireless message from the S. S. Jacob, outbound from San Francisco, that the officers of the steamer had sighted a white-painted deck house floating in the sea near the wreckage of the steamer San Juan. Other wreckage was floating on the surface, and oil covered a large area, the message said.

Survivors Transferred
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—A radio message received by the McCormick steamship lines from the steamer Munam said that the Munam had transferred ten survivors of the sunken San Juan to the coast guard cutter Shawnee, and that the Shawnee was proceeding to its dock in San Francisco bay.

No reason for the transfer of the passengers was given.

Some Survivors
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—The following survivors of the wrecked San Juan were reported among the 27 rescued persons being brought to this port by the steamer S. C. T. Dodd: Mrs. Maude Danby, Los Angeles; Martin Christensen, Berkeley; George Haines, San Francisco; Carl Tulee, University of California hospital; Douglas McCallum, San Francisco.
