NORTH JETTY AT MOUTH OF UMPQUA NEARLY COMPLETE

Construction Work Will Be Finished by End of the Year According to Engineer.

The north jetty at the mouth of the Umpqua river will be completed before the end of the year, which is well within the estimated time, according to George Linton, junior engineer in charge.

The work now in progress by the U. S. engineers consists of extending the north jetty a distance of about 2,500 feet beyond the end of the old work which was built in 1924 and 1925. This extension will fully complete the north jetty, and to the project end. This will make the north jetty slightly over 9,000 feet long and place the outer end in deep water beyond the crest of the bar.

In February, 1928, preliminary construction work was commenced on the extension. Before the placing of rock could be commenced it was necessary to rebuild about one-half mile of old tramway, put up a warehouse and shops and construct a new receiving wharf. This wharf, 50 by 300 feet, is equipped with two derricks of 20 tons capacity each and can handle as much as 1,400 tons of rock in one day.

Early in August, 1928, actual placing of stone was commenced. This stone is furnished by contract by Kern and Kibbe from their quarry on the Umpqua river several miles above Reedsport. It is quarried in pieces averaging 7 or 8 tons each, loaded on barges and towed down the river to the jetty dock. For the last year a steady stream of these barges have been moving down the Umpqua river to the jetty at its mouth where the rock is unloaded with the derricks, placed on cars, hauled to the end of the jetty and dumped.

Construction of the new jetty tramway has been in progress at the same time as the placing of the rock. This 2,600 feet of tramway extension was completed in July of this year. The work of rocking up the tramway is still in progress, but is expected to be completed by Christmas. Already over 200,000 tons of stone have been placed in the extension. It is expected that a total of about 300,000 tons will be needed to bring the encroachment up to the required height which is well above high water.

The total cost to the United States of this extension to the jetty will be about \$700,000. In addition there has previously been spent about \$500,000 by the government and the Port of Umpqua in local harbor improvements.

With the completion of the north jetty this winter, it is anticipated that a channel of at least a depth of 18 feet at low water will be obtained across the bar.
