PARIS, Sept. 7.—Tweeds are at the top of the clothes heap, dominating daytime autumn styles.

Fashion houses show woolen mixtures of tweed type, for coats, suits and dresses, singly and in combination. When the material is not actually tweed we've it may be jersey with a tweed pattern, so preoccupied with mixtures are the designers.

Evening coats, lined with fur, are to replace fur coats for sport in a large degree, apparently. Nearly all the important designers show the fur-lined topcoats as part of their ensembles of dress and evening.

Most of the costumes of woolen mixtures are bell at a normal waist line or have semi-fitted lines which take the normal waistline into consideration. Many of them have broad leather or patent belts, and quite a few of the new coats are double breasted with six buttons fastening.

Big fur collars are less conspicuous on the new coats than they have been in later seasons. Unstuffed collars from two to four inches wide, quite broad revers, an absence of fur on the outside, and belts, are characteristic of the new coat models which set them apart from those of last season.

Dark brown, blue and white and black and white mixtures are the favorites. Some of the tweed coats have kasha linings to match kasha once dresses. In place of fur linings to match dresses.

HOME POINTERS

(From School of Home Economics, O. S. C.)

Clover leaf rolls are very attractive and are easily made. The dough is prepared the same as for bread. After the first rising, small pieces of the dough are shaped into little balls. Three of these are fitted into greased muffin pans allowed to rise till double in bulk and baked in a hot oven. Dough left over from bread making may be used in this way.

A child is likely to become used to and develop a liking for a food which he tastes under happy circumstances, but tasting a new food just once under less favorable or unhappy condition may create a lasting dislike for it.

The safest method for keeping milk in the summer time is in the refrigerator at a temperature of 45 degrees Fahrenheit or below. It is also important that the milk be placed in the refrigerator as soon as possible after delivery and not allowed to stand in the hot sun.

Has Peculiar Cucumbers—

John Kirk, 441 Fullerton street, brought to this office yesterday a specimen of snake cucumbers which are growing in his garden. The vegetable grows in the shape of a snake and bears no resemblance in appearance to an ordinary cucumber, although Mr. Kirk says the vines are the same. The flavor of the snake variety is even better than the common variety and it is not necessary to take the peeling off before using them. Seeds for the vines came from Detroit. The cucumbers vary in length from a few inches to 47 inches.

FLOWERS and Gardens

The September meeting of the Garden club will be held at the Parish house next Monday evening. It will be a good meeting. There are a lot of things to be done in the garden at this time of year. If we want to save money and time on next year's garden. Seedlings are coming up and must be taken care of. Plants can be started from cuttings for winter house plants and some of the perennials can be divided now. And of course early fall is the time for bulb planting. How deep? How far apart? What varieties? Where can we get them? All these questions and a lot of others will be discussed at the Garden club meeting.

Speaking of propagating plants for next year's border, I discovered today that the verbenas that have spread out over the ground have sent down roots at most of the places where the branches rest on the ground. These branches can be cut off and planted in a shady spot as separate plants. So there is no reason why we should not have all the verbenas we want for next year. Most of them are quite hardy and live over winter, and probably in all of them would be safe in a cold frame.

Have you been through the garden at the Soldiers' Home lately? They are a sight worth seeing. And there are ideas there on color and arrangement of flowers that will help anyone in any kind of garden. Don't fail to see the Verbena-bordered walk. It is a sight you will not soon forget. Next to petunias and portulaca, verbenas are the most successful and colorful of all the border plants, take the season through, and perhaps they should be put ahead of these two old stand-bys.

And by the way, I have a lot of petunia seedlings coming up now that I would rather give away to anyone who could use them than have them rot. Of course, nobody knows what colors they will turn out to be.

The night-blooming cereus is not the only night blooming plant. One of the most interesting flowers in the garden is the "evening primrose." Why they are called "primrose" I do not know. They grow in a regular bush and during the evening and for the first half of the next morning are covered with beautiful yellow, poppy-like flowers. One never tires of watching them open. Early in the summer when they begin to blossom the buds are all closed tight till half past seven, when, almost to the minute, they begin to tremble and flutter and open. They open before your eyes. You can see them move, like one of the slowest moving pictures. Some flowers open one petal at a time with quite a grand sweep. Others as slowly and steadily as the moon rises at night. By eight o'clock they are all out and the plant is glorious.

The flowers stay open till the sun withers them when they drop and never open again. But there are just as many more ready to take their places the next night.

I have another night blooming flower. It is a tropical waterlily called "Omanra" a brilliant rose red. The buds are up close to the water the day of the night it is to open and then about the middle of the evening the flower unfolds and stays open till noon the next day when it closes and takes a rest till evening. It repeats this process for three days and then is done. In a few days there will be a regular bush and during the evening and for the first half of the next morning are covered with beautiful yellow, poppy-like flowers. One never tires of watching them open. Early in the summer when they begin to blossom the buds are all closed tight till half past seven, when, almost to the minute, they begin to tremble and flutter and open. They open before your eyes.
