

ATHLETICS NEED 6 MORE VICTORIES TO CLINCH FLAG

As the Cubs marked time through an open date in the schedule yesterday, the Athletics rushed several striders nearer a pennant already theirs to all intents and purposes.

A Philadelphia victory over Cleveland in the first part of a double-header, the permanent removal of the second game from the schedule because of rain and an even break for the Yankees against Detroit all combined to reduce the needs of the Mackmen from nine victories to six.

George Earnshaw sought his twenty-first victory in the opener at Philadelphia yesterday, but discovered tough opponents in Young Waddy Ferrell and certain Indiana Jimmys Fox. The A's a margin of 3 to 2 in the first round of lapping one of Master Ferrell's offerings over the top of the left field seats for his thirty-second homer and his third over the difficult pavilion target this season.

Babe Ruth celebrated with his forty-third and forty-fourth home runs in New York. The second of these blows delivered with two Yanks aboard in the ninth round of the nightcap, sent the ex-champions into a tie and paved the way for them to pull out the decision by 19 to 3 a moment later. The Tigers had won the opener by 8 to 1 through the systematic torture of Herb Pennock and Gordon Rhodes in the early rounds.

Jack Russell achieved the unenviable distinction of losing two games in one day at Boston. The Browns knocked him from the box in less than an inning of the opener, which they won by 6 to 1, and the Red Sox booted home an unearned run in the first round of the second game when he tried to make a comeback. The Browns took this one by 1 to 0. The Washington-Chicago game was prevented by rain.

The National League's abbreviated program was featured by the game at Forbes field. Watson Clark and Jess Petty engaged in a keen pitching duel for seven rounds, only to permit the contest to go completely on the loose in the last two innings. The Pirates pulled out the decision by 7 to 4 when Paul Waner drove in two runs with a triple in the ninth.

The Reds defeated the Giants by 7 to 5 at Cincinnati. The rest had an open date.

MISSIONS WREST LEAD OF LEAGUE FROM HOLLYWOOD

The Reds displaced the Hollywood Stars in the first position yesterday by defeating the southern team at Los Angeles 13 to 3. Sacramento found little trouble disposing of the Seattle Indians in their first series game of the week at the capitol city. The score was 7 to 4.
A 7 to 1 victory for the San Francisco Seals climaxed their clash with the Los Angeles Angels at Recreation park.
Howard Craghead, burly right hander, pitched Oakland to a 2 to 2 triumph over Portland. Until the ninth inning when they made their two tallies on three hits, the Ducks were able to nick for a single safety only. The Oaks reached Chesterfield for their three counters in the second frame.

SENATE BODY TO START NAVY CASE PROBE TOMORROW

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Action by the senate as a whole today was a necessary preliminary to the naval committee's investigation of charges that American shipbuilding corporations had had a part in bringing the Geneva disarmament conference of 1927 to its unsuccessful conclusion.

With the added impetus of vigorous support from the White House, the way was cleared for speedy adoption of a resolution drafted by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, empowering the committee to proceed with its inquiry.

The naval committee will meet tomorrow to draw up plans for its investigation and expects to call as its key witness the central figure in the controversy, William B. Shearer, whose allegations in a suit against three large shipbuilding corporations for compensation for having acted as their agent at the Geneva conference brought vigorous and reiterated expressions of displeasure from President Hoover, the direction of a department of justice investigation by the chief executive, and the pending senate inquiry.

Three Concerns Deny
The New York Shipbuilding company, a subsidiary of the American Brown Boveri Electric corporation, one of the defendants in Shearer's suit, last night issued a statement asserting that neither it nor its parent corporation had ever "directly or indirectly indulged in propaganda to influence the naval policies of the government at Geneva or elsewhere."

The statement said that the company and others had employed Shearer to act as an "observer" at Geneva and that this connection was severed in the fall of 1927. Shearer, it added, was paid \$25,000, his fee "in full," with one third of this amount coming from the New York shipbuilding company.
The two other corporations named in Shearer's suit are the Bethlehem Shipbuilding corporation and the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock company, both of which have issued statements opposing his allegations. Shearer claims more than \$250,000 is due him from the three concerns as compensation for his services at Geneva and elsewhere before and after the conference there.

AIR MAIL INCREASING

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The air mail set a new record during August carrying 698,062 pounds of mail, an increase of 59,252 pounds over July.
Postmaster-General Brown said

today the daily average for the month was 23,268 pounds compared to 20,696 for July.
The Chicago-San Francisco route with 155,285 was first. The New York-Chicago route with 149,354 pounds, second, and the Salt Lake-Los Angeles route with 69,505 pounds was third.

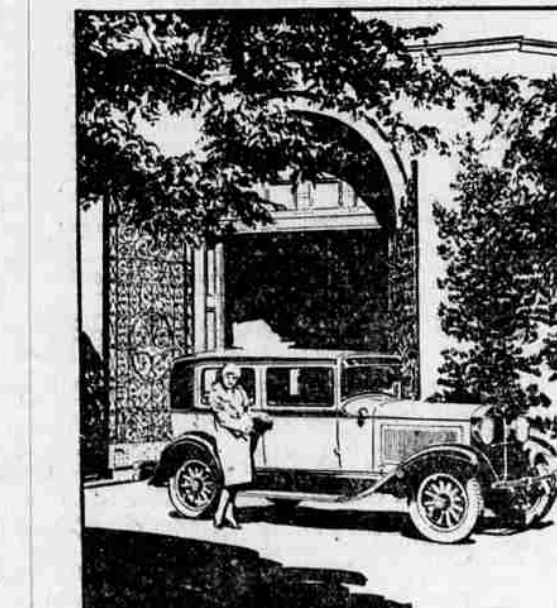
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
