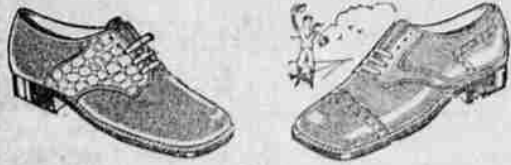

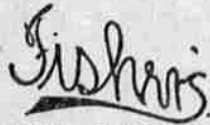

## FIRES CRIPPLE WIRE LINES IN LARGE REGION

and that a survey was impossible. The Canyon creek fire near Pioneer bridge, reported under control yesterday, broke through its bounds last night, necessitating another large crew being sent out today. Its progress was halted this morning.

A big fire is burning on Slide creek, a tributary of South Myrtle creek, but is being handled local by it escaped from a slashing.

Several of the big fires now burning have resulted from slashings that were being burned under permit, the fire being allowed to escape. This is true of the Rogers slash at Lone Rock, the Paradise creek fire between Gunter and Elkton and the Beebe slashing at Elkton.

**Forest Service Has One Fire**

Only one big fire is out from under control in the national forest, according to O. C. Houser, central dispatcher, who reported from his headquarters at Glendale this morning. This fire is burning on Beaver creek close to the Summit ranger station in the Tillier district. The forest service has a crew of 75 men on the blaze, which covers approximately 500 acres, and 100 more men are expected tonight from Portland. The fire is burning in a fairly good stand of fir timber and some valuable reproduction fir.

**Labor Is Scarce**

The need for fire fighters at this time is imperative. All of the local surplus has been used up, and Josephine county has contributed more than a score of men. Exhausted crews are calling for relief and no relief is available. Some of the men now employed are prune growers and cannot be held after their harvest starts, and so must be withdrawn. Altogether the labor situation is offering a very serious problem.

**Plane Sent Back**

The forest patrol plane piloted by William Graham of the Rankin service was sent back to Portland today. Due to the extreme amount of smoke it is impossible to secure an observation of the burning areas, even from the plane, so that it was decided that the skip was of no further use in the local situation.

The only hope at present is a heavy rain. Because of the extreme low humidity it is impossible to extinguish the fires and the best that can be done is to try to hold them in check until a rain comes and higher humidity prevails. Douglas county, even with conditions as bad as they are, is not so bad off as some of the neighboring counties, where many huge fires are raging unchecked.

The Camas Valley fire, which is partly in Douglas and partly in Coos county, is being handled by the Coos county organization and is still spreading. Two men were reported badly hurt there last night. One, it was reported, was struck by a falling tree and it was thought his back was broken. The other was cut by a saw. Their names were not learned here.

**Casualty Toll Nine.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 13.—While flames continued to spread over western Oregon forest fires today had directly or indirectly claimed two lives and caused injury to seven others.

J. H. McCubbin of Eugene was killed and four others were injured last night when a tree fell upon them while fighting near Mable. The injured were: John Kinman, J. E. Carterline, J. C. Kramer and Alvin Peoples. Kinman and Carterline were taken to a hospital at Eugene, where they were said to be seriously hurt, while Kramer and Peoples were treated at Mable for cuts and bruises.

James W. Fowler, vice-president of the Eastern & Western Lumber company, here, died last Saturday from heart disease said to have been aggravated by a tour of the fire lines near his company's mill at Molalla. Mrs. August Frank, who was burned the same day when flames swept her farm home near Mount Angel, was said to be in a critical condition.

Mr. and Mrs. Ira Surcamp suffered severe injuries yesterday when their automobile crashed into a truck near Walton because Surcamp failed to see the truck through heavy smoke from nearby forest fires.

**New Fires Appear.**

At least a dozen new fires were burning in western Oregon today. Three had destroyed 600 acres of timber in the vicinity of Horton, near Eugene. Another had spread over more than 2000 acres in the Siskiyou national forest. Still another was burning near Walterville. Several were reported in the vicinity of Cottage Grove, 20 miles south of Eugene. Valuable stands of government timber were said to be threatened by the latter and calls for additional men were received at the local district forest office.

With the exception of the Rock creek fire, the situation in Coos and Curry counties was considered no worse. The Rock creek fire was burning over an area of about 3000 acres of fire and Port Orford cedar.

"Comparatively quiet but dangerous," said Major John D. Gutherie of the district forest office in describing the fire situation in Washington. A new fire was reported in eastern Grays Harbor county while the Duckabush fire in the Olympic national forest and the Dole fire in Clark county were said to be still burning fiercely.

**Plane Turned Back**

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Sept. 13.—Dr. Glen Moore, Sacramento surgeon, and his brother, Leo Moore, were forced to land at Grants Pass, near here last night after having turned their north bound airplane back twice on account of heavy smoke caused by the forest fires.

## A NEW HOSPITAL

The ROSEBURG GENERAL HOSPITAL, (located in the Perkins Building on Cass Street) will be open to the general public and to all physicians and surgeons and members of the medical profession, on the first day of October, whom we invite to make use of and we extend to them all courtesies.

In the construction and equipping of the ROSEBURG GENERAL HOSPITAL, great care has been exercised to provide the most modern and adequate facilities in all its departments.

Particular attention and care has been given to maternity work including a delivery room and nursery with modern appliances as well as an incubator for the care of premature cases.

There are two surgeries, the major and minor, with operating table of latest design, vacuum drainage, emergency heat, direct and reflected light and a new device operated by electricity for the filtration of the air, absorbing extraneous vapors, deleterious odors and organic matter in the room. In addition to the ordinary anaesthetics used in operations, the surgery has been equipped with ethelene, nitrous-oxide and oxygen for emergency use. Following an operation the surgery will be disinfected by a recently devised electrical equipment, after which it is sealed for future use. There are modern appliances for sterilizing the instruments and dressings.

A portable X-Ray will be installed for bed-side work, also there will be a physio-therapy room fully equipped to give various electric treatments—diathermy, quartz ray, Alpine ray and infra-red ray.

A competent technician has been employed for laboratory work.

There will be private rooms equipped with hot and cold water also Deluxe private rooms with baths. Both men and women's wards will be equipped with baths.

The beds which are the latest hospital models have adjustable springs to provide various restful positions for the patient. All mattresses are of special double comfort construction and will permit disinfection so as to provide the maximum sanitation.

This institution is being financed by local men and its construction is based on the urgent need of an adequate hospital to keep stride with the rapid progress of Douglas County. As far as possible local people will be employed in handling all phases of its work.
