HOME POINTERS

(From School of Home Economics O. S. A. C.)

It is best never to grease an electric waffle iron. If the waffles stick, one or two extra tablespoons of melted shortening in the batter will often solve the problem.

Junket desserts provide an easy means of feeding milk to a child who does not like to drink it. It may be flavored in a number of ways, with extracts, concentrated maple syrup, or caramel syrup. It may also be served with sliced fresh fruits, or with a spoonful of jelly or jam.

In preparing a vegetable dinner it is best always to plan to include some form of protein, either by using beans or peas as one of the vegetables, or by combining some vegetables with a protein food such as cheese, milk, eggs or chopped meat. Examples of vegetables combined with protein foods are green peppers or tomatoes stuffed with a meat mixture, cauliflower or potatoes scalloped with cheese, spinach with hard-boiled eggs, and sweet corn pudding made with milk and eggs.

A delicious sandwich filling is made of chopped pecan meats, almonds or other nuts, with just enough honey to act as a binder. Another filling is made of cream cheese and honey, with nut meats added if desired. These make heartful sweets for the school child's lunch box.

Honey is best kept in a warm place, as cold makes it clod or granulate.

NEXT WINTER TO SEE LONGER SKIRTS WORN

PARIS, Sept. 14.—Winter skirts as shown here are longer, but how much longer is a question every woman will have to decide for herself, taking the time and place into consideration.

Evening styles at the majority of the big houses of design feature skirts that touch the floor in back, or even trail from six to eighteen inches. Some designers have lengthened skirts in front as well as back and show indoor frocks that just clear the toes.

Daytime clothes are another thing. Skirts remain about the same length for sport wear, with an inch or so added by some houses. Street costumes are from one to six inches longer but the average costume will probably not be longer than the top of the calf or the leg.

Afternoon dresses follow their own sweet lines and may be medium length, with even hemlines, or elaborately irregular and almost as long as evening dresses.

Skirt lengths must be considered in relation to the new silhouette or general outline of dresses. These are of two general types—princess frocks with the waistline problem solved by an indeterminate joining of skirt and bodice, and the tube or sheath frock with a belt at the normal waistline.

In both types dresses are lightly fitted to a point close to the knee and then flare and develop into longer panels or points. Sometimes the flares are as long in front as they are in back, but the general rule for evening is frocks that are heel length in back and clear the floor from two or three inches in front.

Belted frocks nearly all show normal waistlines, but one or two important designers retain the modified waistline which is raised only an inch or so above the top of the hips, where it was last season.
