Margaret Churchill, a new face though a pleasing one, and a voice that screens well, was the feminine lead. With good plots to help her, her name will be in the lights some day.

The story of "The Valiant" is a gripping one but for purposes of entertainment has its drawbacks. It lacks much of the usual hokum of movie plots and that perhaps is the reason for its impression of realism that it leaves. The story has a queer beginning and a sad ending. 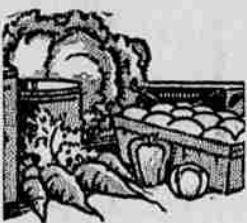
