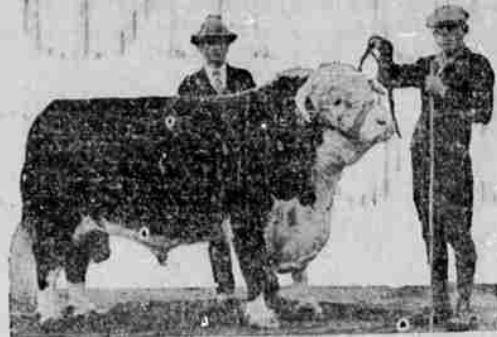

SUGAR A KEY TO TASTEFUL COOKERY
